**MAHANAOY CITY.**

**Damage Caused by a Shaft Hoist Falling.**

MAHANAOY CITY, Nov. 5.—The fall of a large hoist in the Gilbert water shaft yesterday afternoon damaged the hoist, some and timbering of the shaft, but no one sustained personal damage. The shaft is 370 feet deep and the hoist is the only one by which access and descent can be made in it at present.

The official vote for Jury Commissioner is as follows: Amos, Rep., 11,128 votes; Fogarty, Dem., 10,791; W. G. Thomas, Pro., 38. Amos and Fogarty are elected.

Judge Reichter received 21,981 votes.

William Wilkins got one vote in the East ward and three votes in the West ward of Haverhill for Judge. Others receivingattering votes for this office were D. C. Leming, John F. Whalen, Charles Graver, N. Brown, John W. Ryan, W. F. Campbell and Hon. A. R. Savidge, of Seneca.

Michael J. Haughney, of Mahanoy City, has decided to enter the race for the Senatorial nomination on the Democratic ticket.

"Haverhill Phil," an ex-judge of the peace, worked for the success of the Democratic ticket in Mahanoy City on Tuesday.

Candidates are springing up like mushrooms on the Democratic side since the election. Shenandoah has a few, and among the number said to be seeking political preferment the names of H. J. Mulholland and Harry Sandigan are prominently mentioned. They will seek the nomination for County controller. These gentlemen have made no public announcement, but their political friends say they are positive candidates.

The friends of M. M. Burke, Esq., are urging him to enter the race for the District Attorney nomination. If the Judge and Congressional plans go to Portville, it is regarded Mr. Burke would have little trouble in being the nominee.

George J. Wadlinger, Esq., who has had 12 judicial fees pending in his hat for several years, has already entered the race for Democratic nomination. It is said Reichter, Esq., of Portville, is also a candidate.
