

Case Goes Over Until Next Monday, Pending a Motion to Quash the Indictments, to be Argued

on Saturday.

POPTWVILLE, Nov. 10 .- No. 2 court room was growifed this morning by principals and witnesses in the case against the School Di-rectors of West Mahanny township for mis-demeanor, and a large number of people of various degrees of importance attracted to hear the verdict in the criminal libel suit of the Company of the common libel suit of the Commonwealth er. rol. Great interest was manifested in the case and there was much speculation as to what the verdict would be.
