

Bryan "Engaged in a Propaganda of Money Faliacies"-A Proposal to Urge the President to Declare a Gold Standard Not Acted Upon.

New York, Nov. 10 .- The semi-annual meeting of the executive committee of the National Sound Money lengue was begun here yesterday. There were present President George E. Leighton, St. Louis; General Secre-V. Smalley, Henry Villard, Gus tav H. Schwab, J. Kennedy Tod, H. P. Robinson, Edwin Burnit Smith, J. K. Cowan, M. E. Ingalla, J. W. Norwood, Cornwell and Treasurer A. B.

SOUND MONEY LEAGUE.

Hepburn. A donation of \$500 to the Indianapolia Monetary league was granted without dissent. General Secretary Smalley read a communication received from M. C. George, vice president for Oregon, who wrote that he was with the league in all the great questions relating to the currency, and realized the necessity for aggressive work. As to the state, in many places the league would find it honeycombed with financial ignorance and error. The light, he said, should be made to shine in all the dark pinces. was voted to appropriate \$1,000 to ald Mr. George in "spreading the light" in Oregon.

J. Sterling Morton, vice president of the league for Nebraska, wrote:

"Mr. Bryan and his disciples are actively engaged in a propoganda of money failacies. They have united in one conglomerate all the fanatics, bigots and idlots in this state for the pur-pose of upholding the free coinage of silver at a ratio of 16 to 1. It is very painful to observe that this aggrega-tion may quite possibly make a ma-jority of 20,000 at the coming election for candidates who represent all that is for candidates who represent all that is inimical to agriculture and in fact to sound government everywhere." AID FOR THE WHALERS. The Bear Will Carry Provisions to the Arctic Regions.

STARVATION IS NOT PROBABLE.

The Ice Imprisoned Whalers Can Manage to Subsist Until the Proposed Rollef Can Reach Them-Opinions of Naval Officers;

Washington, Nov. 10 .- The informa-tion laid before the cabinet yesterday as a basis for its action in the matter of relieving the whalers was contained

Francisco is the best point to secure the necessary outfits and to sail from. the necessary outfits and to sail from. The whater Thrasher, ready for sea and in good order, can be chartered now. The widest discrition must be given the commanding officer of the ex-pedition for securing the outfit and crew, including dogs and reindeer. Secretary Gage Yesterday received the following telegram from Captain Tutle, in command of the Bear, now at Seartle, Wash.: "Repairs to the Bear and docking the

vessel will cost \$1,500. Before the Bear can reach St. Michaels the bay will be frozen over. Vessel cannot winter at St. Michaels, as the ice would carry it away. There is no harbor north of Unalaska that does not remain frozen until late in june, Behring stralt is closed by ice in November and remains so until June. The whalers at Point Barrow are within six miles of the DAVID FAUST, insurance agent Point and 18 miles of the former refuge station. I understand from Captain McGregor, of the steam whaler Karluk, that Liebes' agent at the refuge station has about 300 barrels of flour. With this and the provisions of the vessels there should be no starvation.

"Those frozen at Demarkation Point have the supply station at Hershell Isl-and to fall back upon. While it will probably be necessary to abandon the yessels I do not apprehend the crews will meet with anything worse than privations and hardships. The Bear can be ready to start in two weeks. There is plenty of coal at Unalaska. I can nee no way of rendering assistance until the ice opens in July. No vessel oan do anything in the Arctic ocean

until July.
