THE GERMANS IN CHINA.

Indications That the Occupation Is More Than Temporary.

London, Nov. 19.—The Shanghai correspondent of The Times says: "Two steamships have been chartered here to convey stores and material to the German fleet in Kiao-Chau. The occupation is apparently no longer than temporary. The Chinese general in command of the forts decided to retire because he had no ammunition." The Berlin correspondent of The Times says: "In the absence of official announcements as to the relations between China and Germany, which, it is said, is still due at Berlin, the cabinet is undecided as to the course to pursue. There have been deliberations between the departments of state concerned, and these are still proceeding, but nothing definite has been determined as to the course to be pursued in the event of China's refusal to accede to the German demands. Probably in that case a prolonged occupation would be necessary, even if it did not belong to the original intention of Germany. The active hostility of the Chinese must be reckoned with as a possible factor, and in that case the cruiser division in Kiao-Chau bay would be reinforced."

MINISTER DIES.

Rev. A. M. Woods, of Mahanoy City, Passed Away This Morning.

Mahanoy City, Nov. 19.—At four o'clock this morning, Rev. Alexander M. Woods, for nearly 26 years pastor of the First Presbyterian church, Mahanoy City, died at his residence on West Mahanoy street.

The subject of this sketch had been ill for several months with an insidious disease which sapped his strength. During the early summer he relinquished his pastoral duties to seek recreation with hopes of regaining his health, but instead returned still further debilitated. His efforts to resume his duties proved futile and demonstrated that his many years of labor had ceased. He was a man singularly devoted to his high calling, and universally respected and highly esteemed. He devoted his entire interest to his flock for which he was loved with more than ordinary degree. He was born in Lewisport, Pa., on July 12, 1831, and was the son of Rev. James Woods D. D., and Marianna Witherspoon. The latter is a descendant of Dr. J. Witherspoon, president of the Princeton college, a Revolutionary patriot and a signer of the Declaration of Independence. Rev. Woods entered Princeton college in 1850 and graduated from that institution. He taught school for some time and later on entered the Theological Seminary at Princeton. In 1860 he married Miss Mary Rittenhouse, of Germantown, N. C. Their union was blessed with five children, of which three and the mother survived. After serving his first charge at Hartsville, Bucks county, for 11 years he came to Mahanoy City, where he remained until death ensued. The funeral will be held on Monday 9 a. m. from his late home on West Mahanoy avenue, where services will be held. Interment will be made at Lewisport, Pa. The deceased served as pastor for a longer period than any other clergyman living or dead in Mahanoy City.

Murderer Franz Electrocutated.
Columbus, O., Nov. 19.—At 11 o'clock, J. Franz, the murderer of Doan's Little of Dayton, was electrocuted in the annex at the Ohio penitentiary at 12:22 this morning. Franz was visited during the day yesterday by his brother and sister, and after parting Franz fainted. He was soon restored to consciousness, however, and had fully regained his composure by the time of his electrocution. He took his place in the chair at 12:18 without an apparent tremor. The current was applied four times before life was pronounced extinct.

Blacklisted Man Gets Damages.
Chicago, Nov. 19.—Fred R. Ketcham was awarded a verdict of \$21,666.33 by the jury in Judge Clifford's court yesterday in his suit against the Northwestern railroad for \$25,000 damages for blacklisting. Ketcham, who was a conductor, went out on the great American Railway Union strike, and since the strike has been unable to secure employment on account of being blacklisted.
