PATHETIC SCENE IN COURT.

Severe Sentence of Eugene Moore, Ex-State Auditor of Nebraska. Lincoln, Neb., Dec. 1.—Ex-State Auditor Eugene Moore, found guilty on Monday of embezzling \$23,000 state funds, was yesterday sentenced to eight years in the penitentiary. The sentence was a surprise and a crushing blow to the prisoner, who had expected nothing but nominal punishment, and the scene in the court room was as affecting as it was dramatic.

Moore's attorneys will appeal to the supreme court. Moore was twice elected state auditor, and his family moved in exclusive society.

Eleven Killed, Twenty-two Injured. Warsaw, Dec. 1.—A terrible railway accident has occurred here. While a passenger train was stationary at the terminus a heavy freight train crashed into it, owing to the error of a pointman. Eleven persons were killed outright and 22 others were seriously injured.

HE VICTIMIZED MINISTERS. An Alleged Bogus Check Swindler Arrested at Atlantic City. Atlantic City, Dec. 1.—A man who registered at a local hotel as J. Barnes, of New York, was arrested yesterday on a charge of horse stealing, but it is now asserted by police that he is an extensive bogus check swindler, and the belief, from papers found on him, is that he is Thomas Seymour Meyer, of Bluefield, W. Va. He was held under \$1,000 bail. It is said in a report with the Girard Trust company, of Philadelphia, with a worthless check for \$3,000, endorsed by a prominent divine, and that he victimized a Philadelphia hotel out of a big board bill. It is said that Meyer, who is a clerical looker on face, gained the good grace of Presbyterian ministers and induced them to cash checks for him.

CHRONIC PAUPERISM.

Interesting Report from New York's Charity Organization Society. New York, Dec. 1.—A report that is probably the only one of the kind made in this country was completed yesterday by the committee on statistics of the Charity Organization Society. The report consists of a careful analysis of the records of 500 families from the time they applied for aid in 1896 until Sept. 1 of this year. In referring to the repetition of applications for relief the report says:

"There is a disclosure of chronic pauperism. This pauperism exists to a large degree because of the incapacity of men and women to support themselves. Their condition is due, investigation shows, to a lack of mental and moral development."

Of the persons who applied for aid the largest number were married men and women. Widows with children came next. Of the 500 applicants 170 were Irish and 132 were natives of the United States. Many of the latter were persons who had lived in this city less than a year. The list includes 100 of good character and 221 women of good character. The remainder were professional beggars, criminals and chronic paupers.

Her Clothing Burned From Her Body. Trenton, Dec. 1.—Mrs. Mary A. Johnson, of Ashmore avenue, was burned to death yesterday afternoon. Mrs. Johnson's dress caught fire from a hot coal while she was raking the kitchen fire. Her cries attracted the attention of her son, who went to her assistance. Her clothing was entirely burned from her body, and she died two hours later.

THE BRITISH IN CHINA.

John Bull Seemingly Another Strip of China. Trenton, Dec. 1.—The morning papers assert that China has practically agreed to cede to England a strip of territory near Hong Kong and all the surrounding islands in order to enable England to fortify them securely and increase the garrison. It is expected that a convention covering the agreement will soon be signed.

Hong Kong, which is an island belonging to the British off the southeast coast of China, about 75 miles from Canton, was ceded to Great Britain by the treaty of Canton in 1842 and again by the treaty of Nanking in 1842. It is the great center of the foreign trade of China. The island is separated from the mainland by a strait, which at Ly-moon pass is only about a quarter of a mile wide. A small portion of the mainland belongs to the British colony.

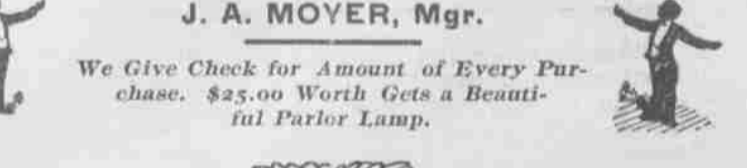
