FINANCE AND TRADE

As Viewed by the Two Leading Commercial Agencies.

OUTLOOK STILL SATISFACTORY.

Railroad Earnings For December Show a Gratifying Increase Over Last Year's Business—Wheat Market Languid—Little Speculation.

New York, Jan. 15.—R. G. Dun & Co.'s weekly review of trade says: The year has opened with a very satisfactory prospect. It is all the better that there is no wild excitement in the speculative markets, and while stocks advance a little grain is a trifle higher. The movement through principal clearing houses, notwithstanding a decrease at New York, owing to less activity in stocks, are 2.6 per cent larger than in 1892 and 10.1 per cent larger outside New York.

Earnings of all railroads in the United States reporting for December, \$43,354,279, indicate substantially the same rate of increase, exceeding last year's by 10.5 per cent, and the earnings of 1892 for the same roads by 1.3 per cent. Since 1892 was on the whole the most prosperous year thus far, comparisons indicate, notwithstanding the lowest prices ever known, that the volume of business is larger, and, in spite of some cutting of rates, the earnings of railroads are larger than in the best year of past history.

The wheat market has been curiously languid, yielding a quarter of a cent, although Atlantic exports amount to 6,056,788 bushels for the two weeks of January, against 3,966,317 last year, and Pacific exports for the week have been 1,275,570 bushels. Western receipts continue so heavy that, with the greatest accumulation of wheat at Chicago ever known, there is little encouragement for speculation, and receipts were 5,727,250 bushels for the two weeks, against 3,696,685 bushels last year.

Corn exports continue large, though not equal to last year's, amounting to 3,136,688 bushels, against 4,147,652 bushels for the week last year, and the price declined about three-fourths of a cent. Spot cotton is a sixteenth lower for making uplands, mainly because of the stoppage of some mills by difficulty about wages. But nothing is definitely known about the quantity of cotton yet coming forward, and one report of creditable character puts the year's yield at 10,570,250 bales, though results thus far do not quite justify so large an estimate.

The woolen manufacturers have been buying wool largely, and for reasons not publicly explained. It is evident that large orders have been taken by the leading mills and at prices which they find satisfactory, and the rush of small mills to buy wool has made most of the market during the past week, although sales have declined about 40 per cent, compared with the previous week. But there is decidedly better demand for men's wear goods, and the makers look forward to a good season. The cotton manufacturers, heavily overstocked by excessive production, find no increase in demand and no gain in prices.

Brackets' review says: Distributive trade remains rather quiet, mild weather throughout the country tending to check distribution of winter goods. Prices generally remain steady or tend upward, except for some grades of iron, and orders for spring trade, where received, are encouraging. Industrial activity is most manifest at the west, where the demand for iron is very large. A feature of the week was the placing of an order by one railroad for 100,000 tons of steel rails, with smaller orders aggregating in the neighborhood of 25,000 tons more. Pig iron production is now at an unprecedented rate, the furnace capacity being estimated at 1,000,000 tons a month. At the south manufacturing activity is a feature, sales of iron being very heavy.

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AN ITALIAN REPUBLIC.

The Pope Said to Favor a Change of Government.

CARDINAL RAMPOLLA'S POLICY.

A Supposed Inspired Article in Which It is Asserted That the Coexistence of the Vatican and the Italian Monarchy is Impossible.

London, Jan. 15.—The Home correspondent of The Daily Chronicle, in a startling statement this morning, quoted largely from an article in Civita Cattolica, which, he declares, is directly inspired by the Vatican and the pope, advocating as the solution of the eternal question between the Vatican and the kingdom the establishment of an Italian republic. The article, which is based on the pope's Christmas allocution, declares that the thing which stands opposed to the Italian republic is not the Italian unity, but "the special and concrete form wherein that unity is at present maintained, with results much more disastrous to the state than to the Holy See." It proceeds to assert that the coexistence of the Vatican and the Italian monarchy is impossible, and that one or the other must go. It then suggests the constitutions and cities of Switzerland and America as examples of "admirable and glorious constitutions, true unities of nation and state, though differing from the Italian unity, which has produced nothing but weakness, misery and starvation."

The article concludes: "Without the aid of foreign bayonets the true Italy will find for itself its own way and will rise again, let us hope, from the slumber in which it now lies prostrate to its greatness." The Daily Chronicle's correspondent asserts that this is "an intentional revelation to the outer world of the policy actuating the inner mind of Cardinal Rampolla, papa's minister of state. Probably there would be no truth in the supposition that either Cardinal Rampolla or the pope has any idea of even a temporary alliance with the republican party, but yet they believe that, while peace with the king is possible, it must be on the basis of a republic. The reason for the appearance of this astounding pronouncement at the present moment is the belief that not only the ministry, but the dynasty itself is menaced more seriously than usual."
