The Republican Candidates For Borough Nominations.—Legal Opinions.

Mahanoy City, Jan. 17.—The Republican Standing Committee met last evening and arranged the tickets for the primaries. The following are the borough candidates: For corporation—George Stueck, Silas Davis, James Collins, Benjamin Phillips, Louis H. Adams, For Auditor—Almer L. Morris and Geo. W. Miller.

An interesting question came up at the meeting as to whether a person who had not paid taxes within two years was eligible as a candidate. Hon. T. H. B. Lyon was called for an opinion. It was shown that the party in question had paid taxes for 1895 to 1897. Mr. Lyon said the law specified that the voter shall pay a state or county tax within two years before the election, and the fact that the tax paid is for a year more than two years back does not invalidate the vote.
