



SHERIFF SHOT FIRST.

Another Witness Declares Martin Started the Lattimer Massacre.

AND HE BROUGHT DOWN HIS MAN

Only Three Witnesses Testified at Yes terday's Brief Session of the Court. and All of Them Had Been Wounded by the Fatal Volley.

Wilkesbarre, Pa., Feb. 16.-It was 2 'clock yesterday afternoon before court opened for the trial of Sheriff Martin and his deputies, charged with the killing of the Lattimer strikers. The morning session was abandoned owing to it being election day. None of the jurors voted, however, although four of

them live in this city.

The first witness called was John lieved me so that I Platak. He told about the march to was soon able to move West Hagleton, and said that the sheriff flourished his revolver very freely, and told the strikers they had better go home, or there would be trouble. When they arrived at Lattimer the deputies were waiting for them with their guns ready. When the shooting commenced the witness said he stool still, and was so frightened he could not move for a minute or two. Then he started to run, but had gone only about 200 yards when he was shot in the left leg, the ball passing through his calf. He exhibited the wound to the jury. He said he saw a number of men fall, most of them in the ditch alongside the railroad track. When asked if the sheriff did any shooting he said: "He had a re-volver, but what he did with it I could

The cross examination of Platek brought out the fact that the Harwood men stopped work upon the order of their bosses, who said that as soon as the McAdoo strikers approached they should leave the colliery. They did so.
The McAdoo men were armed with
sticks. He also said that as one of the
committeemen he proposed going over
to Lattimer alone, but one of the strikers said they would beat him if he did

so, so he went with the crowd. Casper Wishniski swore that the sheriff fired the first shot, and the man he fired at fell. Witness was about 20 yards away at the time. He said the sheriff stepped to the side of the road, aimed his revolver and fired. A man standing about three yards away fell. He did not know the man's name. The witness ran away and reached a point nearly 200 yards away from the deputies before being hit. He then got a bullet in the left leg, just below the knee, and one in the right thigh. Neither wound was serious. Asked if he knew any of the deputies who did the shooting at Lattimer, he said he could pick out some, and walking down to where they sat indicated 16 of them. The cross examination failed to break

down any the the evidence about the sheriff firing the first shot and hitting a man, but it did break up much of the force of the evidence about the deputies, the witness saying that when he pointed them out he did not mean that they were shooting, but that they were there-at Lattimer.

John Bunk, of Cranberry, said he was shot in the head while 200 yards away from the deputies. The ball carried away the bone alongside the head from the ear to the eye, and there is no bone there now. The course of the builet is clearly marked by a depression along


