DEMOCRATS CONFER. The Leaders Make a Demand Upon Candidates for Appointments.

The Democratic leaders of town were in conference last night, in the hall rooms of the Hotel building. The meeting was called at the invitation of the faction of the party headed by Frank Hanna and John J. Tully, and its primary object is said to have been in the interest of one or two applicants for appointment on the police force.

The meeting passed resolutions recommending the appointment of John Jennings, of the Third ward, and Thomas Dalton, of the Second, as members of the police force. What is known as a conference committee was also appointed. It consists of three members from each ward, including the committeemen from each ward. In the event of a disagreement at the committee, caucus this committee of fifteen is to be called for the purpose of settling a compromise. In other words, they are to usurp the functions of the Councilmen and practically make the appointments and the Democratic members of Council are supposed to sanction and vote for the slate presented by this committee.

This program is not looked upon very favorably by some of the Councilmen, and there are murmurs of dissatisfaction from that source. Said one of them last night: "While I have no objection to a man who has never been of any service to me, simply because one or two of the leaders feel friendly toward him. Besides, those who engineered the meeting assume a dictatorial spirit in usurping the powers that rightly belong to us. We will organize harmoniously. If these people will attend to their own affairs, otherwise they may be trouble."

The appointment of water superintendent and policeman are causing the greatest trouble. There are two prominent candidates for the superintendency, Thomas Hand and James Bell. There are two other candidates in the background, but they probably develop more strength. Neither Hand nor Bell will give way to each other.

There is a small army of candidates for the police force, but the prominent ones are Patrick Graham, John Jennings, Thomas Dalton, Patrick Murphy, Patrick Butler, Martin Doyle and Henry Metz. Promises have been made to the Polish faction to give them a representative on the force, but none of the Councilmen care to take him up as their portion of the spoils.

Michael Kerrigan has strong petitions in his behalf for supervisor, and he is certainly deserving of it. He is a prominent member of the Phoenix Fire Company. Committee Chairman Dremann has a candidate in the person of his brother, while some are trying to ex-communicate him.

The secretaryship is a contingency. John Cardin, the ex-Judge, is an applicant, and so is John Curtin. While M. J. Lawlor is not an applicant, his appointment is urged because of his well-known abilities for the position. The name of James Caskey is also mentioned for the superintendency. The Councilmen favor it, creating this official's salary to \$500 a month and give him charge of the Water Superintendent's books in addition to his other duties.

No candidate is mentioned in opposition to T. J. Mulhally, recently elected Borough Treasurer. He appears to be the unanimous choice of the Councilmen, although some of the members object to the salary, about \$100 a month.

The Council will take into consideration the "man on the dump," engineers and firemen at the pumping station and the assistant to water superintendent.

The Democratic politicians are awaiting the result of the struggle with much interest, while the applicants are urging their claims with renewed energy. The position of the majority members of Council is anything but a enviable one, especially at this time.
