"The question of whether it was necessary to resort to the extremeans of firing on the strikers in orde which cannot be questioned, though it shall appear that the firing was not necessary, if the judgment was honestly formed and executed.

"If any deputy wiifully, knowingly and maliciously continued firing after the necessity for firing had coused, and did by such firing kill Mike Cestak, he may be found guilty under the in dictment, but to convict any one the jury must be satisfied beyond a reason doubt that some person did so fire, and be able to identify the person that he did it wilfully and m intending to kill; that Mike Ceslak was

killed by such person.
"As the testimony does not disclose the identity of any person whared in the manner described, a con sily for the accommodation of pupils of the viction of any of the prisoners would not be warranted.

"Before any one of the prisoners car be convicted, the jury must be satisfied beyond a reasonable doubt tha some one of them had special malice toward the deceased, or general malice toward the whole body of sirikers, and intended unlawfully to kill some one of

"It appears from the evidence, sub-stantially without dispute, that the prisoners were lawfully aiding the sheriff as a posse, duly appointed, at the time Mike Cesink was killed, and that their purpose was to disperse at unlawful assemblage, of which the deconspiracy among them to do an un-lawful act or to do a lawful act in an unlawful way. Therefore, the act of one cannot be imposted to the others. Each one is to be held accountable on for what he himself did.
