Speaker Reed although opposed to the bill, will take it from the Speaker's table, where it now lies, and let the House pass upon it. The friends of the measure are confident that they can command a majority in its favor.

HOPK springs eternal in the breast of the average Pottsville patriot. They profess to believe that the public building will be forthcoming within the next decade. There is every reason to believe that their hopes will be realized when federal positions no longer occupy the un- divided attention of the representa- tives at Washington.

In accounting for their abandon- ment of the plan to send a relief ex- pedition to the Yukon country, the Washington authorities say that "the conditions have changed." By this, probably, they mean that they now have facts instead of rumors to guide their actions, which is always a change of conditions much to be de- sired.

AN Upper Lehigh correspondent, writing to the Philadelphia Press, mentions the value of anthracite coal for use in our naval vessels in preference to the bituminous product which is always liable to the much talked of spontaneous combustion. The govern- ment annually expends such vast sums in the construction of vessels that anthracite coal might just as well be used, even if it is a bit more expensive than the bituminous. Some day a vessel will blow up and the cause will have been found to be spontaneous combustion. To avert any such accident, the penny wise pound foolish policy of the government should be discarded and best provision made for none but the best anthracite coal—and right in this region is where it is found.

THERE is a general demand among the people that the time has arrived for the President to perform his full duty in regard to Cuba. No matter what may be the report of the Board of Inquiry as to the Maine calamity, the United States is looked to stop the hostilities on this unhappy island. The feeling in relation to Cuba is not the growth of a day. An effort to treat it as a transient excitement, to be quieted by procrastination, shows a lack of sound judgment. By grant- ing independence to Cuba, on some practicable terms, Spain can dispel the war cloud and retain the valuable friendship of this country; but if she

will not, then a brave heart and a prompt arm is what the American people demand in their leadership.

### ROGER Q. MILLS TO RETIRE.

THE TEXAS Senator to Leave the Field Open to Governor Culberson. Houston, Tex., March 7.—The Post prints a letter from United States Senator Roger Q. Mills in which he formally withdraws from the race for re-election, which leaves the field to Governor C. A. Culberson. In his letter Mr. Mills gives as the principal reason for his withdrawal the recent action of the state executive committee, which made a stringent test for all persons desiring to participate in Democratic primaries and conventions. He says: "The action of the executive committee in disfranchising a large element of the party was done to discriminate the nom-

ination of certain others. The effect of this action will be that not only those proscribed will be excluded, but such disloyal among other Democrats will be proscribed that but few will attend them, and those few will be adherents of the favorites intended to be benefited by the exclusion."

He then goes on to deny that he has deserted him, and goes into his record at length, concluding by saying: "Now that the great body of the commercial world has taken its stand against silver, I do not believe it in the power of the United States alone, by its independent action, to restore the value of silver to par with gold at 16 to 1."

### FATAL FIRE IN PITTSBURG.

One Dead and Three Probably Dying as a Result.

Pittsburg, March 7.—One of the most exciting fires the Pittsburg department has ever been called upon to fight occurred at 614 Webster avenue yesterday, when one woman was suffocated and five other people so badly burned that three may die. Three families were housed in a ramshackle building and the stairs eaten away by flames while they slept. Here is the result of 12 minutes' captivity: Dead: Mrs. Leonie Enrieillo, aged 30, wife of Dominic Enrieillo, fruit huckster, was separated from her husband in the smoke, was suffocated while trying to raise a window, and died in the street wagon. Injured: Harry Levin, aged 16, burned about face, arms and shoulders, injuries possibly fatal; Lillian Levin, aged 6, burned about hands, feet and face, condition serious; Max Vertinski, aged 18, burned about legs and head, and fatally injured internally; Jessie Vertinski, aged 22, his wife, burned about neck, feet and face, injuries serious; Ethel Vertinski, aged 8 months, burned about hands, head and body, will probably die; Elizabeth Levin, aged 18, ankle broken by jumping from second story window, and also hurt internally; Rita Levin, aged 3 years, thrown from second story window and badly bruised.

Trapped at 614 Webster avenue in three story brick tenement, and slinky. On the first floor and the rear of the second floor lived Sam Levin, with his wife and seven children. On the second floor front lived Dominic Enrieillo, with 12 wife. On the third floor lived Max Vertinski with his wife and 8-month-old baby.

### FATAL STREET ENCOUNTER.

One Dead and Two Wounded in a Battle at Texarkana.

Texarkana, Ark., March 7.—The fiercest street battle ever witnessed in Texarkana occurred yesterday afternoon. Five men were engaged in the desperate fight, one of whom was killed outright, another mortally wounded, and a third seriously injured, while the other two are in hiding and the extent of their wounds is not known. The casualties: Vinson Graviano, dead, shot through the heart; S. Graviano, mortally wounded, shot through the breast, shoulder, arm and leg; Pete Darrigo, seriously wounded in the groin and leg.

The tragedy occurred in that portion of the city known as Swanpoodle, and all the participants were barbers. A. Gintotta and his son-in-law, Mike Canola, were disputing in front of Antonio Columbus' saloon, and were about to come to blows when the Graviano brothers attempted to stop the argument. Gintotta and Canola then turned upon the Gravianos, and both sides drew revolvers. More than 30 shots were fired. The man who was killed began shooting as he approached Gintotta, who floored him with a blow from his pistol and fired the fatal shot into his body. Canola fired more than a dozen bullets at S. Graviano, half of which took effect. Gintotta and Canola are still at large.

### NUGGETS OF NEWS.

Tramps in the Lehigh county (Pa.) jail live on bread and water and are required to carry pig iron.

Governor Fingree will call a special session of the Michigan legislature for March 15, to consider railway and tax issues.

Mrs. Nellie J. Peterkin, of Paterson, N. J., has been sentenced, at Boston, to five years for killing Mrs. Katherine Murphy.

Special efforts are being made in Chicago to have the Christian Science Convention, in July, 1899, held in that city.

C. D. Wingate, of Brooklyn, attempted suicide by taking Paris green, at the National Hotel, Washington, D. C. He may survive.

While firing a salute at the Emmett centennial, Frankford, N. Y., William Overton was fatally injured, and Armorel Dixon seriously hurt.

The condition of General Rosecrans, who is lying ill at his ranch near Los Angeles, Cal., is slightly worse, though his physicians say there is hope of his recovery.

Lieutenant Frank Kalke, United States commandant at Iowa Wesleyan university, Mount Pleasant, was cut in train while attempting to board a train.

### Bulgarian Editor Assassinated.

Constantinople, March 7.—Saturday a Bulgarian visited M. Makedonsky, first secretary of the Bulgarian exarchate and editor of the Bulgarian newspaper Novino, the organ of the exarchate, and after demanding the reason for the non-publication of a certain paragraph, drew a revolver and shot M. Makedonsky. The wounded man lingered until yesterday, when he died. His assailant escaped. The police have arrested 50 persons on suspicion.

### WAR FEELING IN HAVANA.

The Warship Vizcaya is in a Constant State of Readiness.

Havana, March 7.—As the conviction becomes settled that the court of inquiry will decide that there was a mine explosion under the Maine discussion among American naval officers and civilians here is prevalent as to the warlike measures which it is believed the United States government will adopt in case the question of the payment of indemnity by Spain is over-ruled. A majority believe that American troops will be landed at some point east of Havana and the insurgents communicated with, that the Spanish soldiers will be defeated or captured in detail, and that in the meantime a fleet of United States vessels will blockade, if not bombard, Havana. No one seems to doubt that the reduction of this city will be comparatively easy. Four 12 inch guns—two west and two east of the city—are the only ones that are considered dangerous. There are likely to be well served, while their emplacements are not modern.

That some Spaniards are of the opinion that an attack on Havana will be made is believed to be shown by the abnormal activity displayed on board the Vizcaya. This correspondent has the best naval authority for the statement that the Vizcaya is in a constant state of readiness for emergency, and that pocket boats are on the alert day and night.

It is pointed out that the men-of-war Vizcaya and Almirante Oquendo, when the latter arrived, might be caught in a blockade and fall an easy prey to the United States fleet. This is a serious matter for the Spanish government, and would be of no use. All this discussion of the probability of war among the Americans and Spaniards proves nothing, and only shows the state of feeling here.

The conduct of the Spanish divers who are investigating the wreck of the Maine is a mystery. Thus far they have not been down five hours in the aggregate, and they show no disposition to make a thorough inquiry. It is impossible to learn the truth fully regarding the purpose of the Spanish court of inquiry, but it is generally believed that the divers were sent down for a single purpose, and that a report will be made in an ordinance with instructions from Madrid. It may be that the Spanish divers have discovered that the whole port side of the Maine forward is gone, and having so reported, further examination is deemed unnecessary. The work of our own divers henceforward is bound to be slow, owing to the ponderous weight to be moved and the safety clamps, nuts and rivets that must be cut.

Senator Fingree is likely to make a speech in the senate on his return that will have great weight in determining the future policy of the United States. He is much affected by the suffering that he found in Alabama, and highly indignant at the state of the "majority of the course pursued." During a visit to Armenia, this province, he saw thousands of reconcentrados who refused to be, though starving. They were evidently of a class accustomed to great luxury, and he is unwilling to become paupers. He saw thousands of acres of the best tobacco and banana lands in the world reduced to waste, with troops and garrisons at every point, and he is pointing to the mountains 15 miles away, said: "There are plenty of insurgent camps there that the Spanish have never discovered."

In addition to Henri Laine, the American correspondent, Vicente Pardo Suarez, editor of La Republica, and 11 others have been arrested, making 13 in all. Eight are in cell 47 and five in cell 46 at Cabanas Fortress. Henri Laine will be sent north on Wednesday. It is officially stated, from American sources, that two or more American correspondents will be required to return to the United States at the same time. The prisoners are charged with conspiracy. In all 15 are implicated. Eleven, it is said, will be sent out of the country and seven to the Isle of Pines.

To Release Irish Political Prisoners. London, March 7.—The six remaining Irish political prisoners lying in English jails convicted of dynamite offenses will be released in June. This information was given by an Irish Nationalist member on the authority of a cabinet minister. ### THE WORK OF CONGRESS.

Maine Survivors Reiter and the Army Increase Bills in the House.

Washington, March 7.—It is probable that both the bill for the relief of the survivors and the victims of the Maine disaster and the senate bill creating two additional regiments of artillery with which to man the coast defenses will pass from E. J. King's drug store. The former bill was held up until it could be investigated, as it was said that the special bill for the relief of the survivors and victims of the Samsen wreck in 1858 led to some scandal. That bill was loosely drawn, and it has been asserted some advantage of its provisions were taken. The present bill has been carefully drawn, and is one satisfactory to Mr. Cannon, chairman of the committee on appropriations.

Practically all opposition to the artillery bill has not disappeared in the house. The leaders were, it is said, in favor of delaying action upon it to allay public alarm, which might have been intensified had it been rushed through the house as it was through the senate. Beyond action on these two measures the house program this week, so far as is now anticipated, is entirely peaceful and has no reference to possible foreign complications. The senate will begin the week with the construction of the bill making appropriations for the District of Columbia, and when this is completed take up the conference report on the legislative, executive and judicial appropriation bill. It is considered quite probable that the District bill will consume two or three days, or even more. One of the questions in this bill which may arouse debate is the action of the senate committee on appropriations in striking out the item in the bill as it came from the house limiting telephone charges in the district. There will be an effort made to restore this provision.

### ACTIVITY AT LEAGUE ISLAND.

The Rapid Pushing of Work Looks Like Approaching War.

Philadelphia, March 7.—Yesterday was a repetition of the previous Sunday in the general activity at League Island and navy yard. Workmen were busily engaged upon the cruiser Minneapolis, the monitor Miantonomah and the ram Katahdin. In addition work was going on in the mold loft, and several forgings were in operation in the blacksmith shop. The utmost reticence prevailed among the officers, sailors and workmen at the yard, and it was impossible to obtain any official information as to the detail of the work going on. It was evident, however, that all work was being pushed as rapidly as possible. The immense crowds which flocked to the naval station the previous Sunday were largely increased yesterday, but no one was allowed to get close to the warships. Sentries were posted at the entrance to the wharves, and only workmen and those on business were allowed inside the lines. The old single turret monitors in the back channel, relics of the late war, were an attraction to thousands, and their decks were crowded all day long. It was reported that five of these will be taken out of their berths as soon as possible and tested with modern guns aboard.

It was reported that the cruiser Colorado, under the command of Admiral Schley, was ordered to sail for Key West as soon as possible. This could not receive any official verification. The cruiser has had her bottom scraped, and the work of painting her began today.

Mine Watchmen Routed Alive. El Paso, Tex., March 7.—News has reached here that the San Domingo mine in the Santa Fe district, 15 miles southeast of Chihuahua, was burned last Thursday night. At midnight the night shift of 500 men went up the shaft to eat lunch, leaving two of their number on watch down on the 1,400 foot level. When the workmen started to return to their work they found the mine on fire and the shaft full of smoke. They could hear the shrieks of the two watchmen who were being roasted alive. The mine was heavily timbered throughout and only the saving in of the mine extinguished the flames. The loss amounts to \$500,000, and it will be 12 months before the mine can be operated.
