It is told in Kansas City that a woman on an excursion party, which was booked for one and one-half days' stop there, delayed the departure of the excursion train an hour and ten minutes and caused the disturbance of the schedule of the Santa Fe Railroad from Kansas City to Albuquerque, all because she stopped at a dry goods bargain counter.

THE constables of Mahanoy City had a very uncomfortable quarter of an hour when making their quarterly reports of violations of law in their respective bailiwicks, and the end apparently is not reached yet. It would be interesting to hear the answers of some of Shenandoah's constables when closely pressed upon the same question of violation of the license law.

THE Roman congregation of the Holy Office has just sent to this country a decree regulating the use of flags in decorating Catholic churches, which forbids the use of national, state or other secular emblems. The decree also prohibits the use of the unblended banner of private societies. The decree admits that the American flag is one which should be to all Americans a glorious emblem, but rules that it cannot therefore be considered as a fitting decoration for the House of God. This mandate from Rome was issued in consequence of the friction between Bishop McDonnell, of Brooklyn, and one of his priests in consequence of the Bishop's action in commanding that an American flag with which a church was decorated should be removed from the edifice.

It is noticeable that at the sessions of the Naturalization court applicants show greater proficiency as to this government and its laws, and the reason of this was made plain at court on Saturday. One of the applicants displayed a small pamphlet of about twenty-five pages, entitled "Politiksky Katchismis," or Political Catechism. It is printed in the Slavonian language, and sells for 10 cents per copy. The pamphlet contains questions and answers as to our form of government, the various departments, how the laws are made and where, the powers of Congress and the President—in fact, it is one of the most complete little catechisms on government published. Judge Koch, after examining it, most highly endorsed it and urged all applicants for naturalization to procure a copy. It is said a similar book has also been published in the Italian language. The book was gotten out since the question of naturalization has been in our courts, and is accomplished good.

Organization of the Borough Council last evening was effected under peculiar circumstances, and with a total disregard of all honor on the part of at least two members of that body. Messrs. Bell and Harkins, the two newly-elected members, violated a solemn obligation, and if there is any dishonor attached to the proceedings the people will not be slow to place it. The details of the "deal" between these two men and the six Citizen members of Council are given in our news columns, and we leave the people to pass judgment. In commenting upon the "deal" made by them, our Democratic contemporary, the Daily News, styles them "two treacherous Democrats" and says they "shoulder an odium that will cling to their skirts as long as they reside in the town." If they are subject to such criticism for breaking party ties, we can imagine the feeling of their colleagues when they violate a most solemn obligation. All will concede that the Democrats, having elected a majority of Council, should reap the fruits of their victory, and we know of none better satisfied with such a result than the Citizens members of Council. The latter offered no inducements to the recalcitrant Democrats. These two made certain overtures and they were accepted. We do not think,

TO UNLOAD ON UNCLE SAM.

An Alleged Syndicate For the Sale of Flimsily Built Warships.

Philadelphia, March 8.—Charles H. Cramp, head of the shipbuilding firm, today declared that the widespread talk of Spain buying warships abroad and the securing of options on these ships by the United States is part of a scheme instigated by a syndicate of adventurers. Their purpose, he said, is to secure big commissions by helping English and German shipbuilders to unload on this government a number of unseaworthy vessels built either on speculation or by contract with various of the second rate powers that are not able to pay for them.

Mr. Cramp said: "The total value of the ships involved in this deal is about \$5,000,000. The commissions which the speculative syndicate would receive for disposing of them to the United States would be about 15 per cent of the selling price, or \$2,250,000 on the whole lot." Mr. Cramp declined to divulge the names of the members of the syndicate, but said it was composed of an Anglo-American combination embracing a large manufacturing establishment in England, one of the most noted contract brokers in New York City, and a prominent manufacturer in the manufacture of advance materials both in this country and abroad.

Mr. Cramp added: "The shipbuilding industry in England has been for the past year or so seriously crippled by the great strike in the engineering trades. The houses have delayed in the delivery of warships built for foreign account far beyond the contract time, and the ships have been thrown back on their hands in some cases, or they have been subjected to serious penalties in others. For these reasons it is a great object for them to unload on the United States." The ship in question, he continued, are all cheaply and flimsily built, and none of them anywhere near the American naval standard, either as to workmanship or material.

Seattle, Wash., March 8.—The government's Alaska relief expedition, with the 537 reindeer and 113 Laplanders, which left New York last Tuesday, March 1, reached here last evening, having made the unprecedented time for freight trains of six days from coast to coast. Triple Lynching Follows Murder. Rock Springs, Wyo., March 8.—Valentine Hoy's friends have caught and lynched three of the murderers of Hoy. The men lynched are L. J. Johnson, a man named Bremer, and a third man whose name cannot be learned. Some days ago Johnson, who was a cowboy employed on Hoy's ranch, near Rock Springs, shot and killed a boy named Willie Strong for a trivial provocation. He escaped and joined some of "Butch" Cassidy's outlaws. Hoy joined a sheriff's posse which went in pursuit. The posse came upon Johnson and two others in Ladore Canyon, when a fight occurred. In which Hoy was killed. The outlaws were, however, surrounded in the canyon, and finally captured and lynched.

The killing of Hoy, who was a prominent man, has stirred up the authorities of Colorado, Wyoming and Utah, and it is now proposed to send the combined military of the three states, if necessary, against the Cassidy gang, which occupies an almost impregnable fortress known as "Robbers' Roost," near Vernal, Utah.

A PRINCELY DONATION.

Duc de Loubat Presents Columbia With Property Worth \$1,100,000. New York, March 8.—Property valued at \$1,100,000, having a frontage of 125 feet on Broadway and extending through to Mercer street, was formally accepted by the board of trustees of Columbia university at a meeting of that body yesterday. The donation will be known as "the Gaillard-Loubat Library Endowment Fund," and will be used for the benefit of the library. The donor is Joseph F. Loubat, known in the courts of Europe as the Duc de Loubat. He divides his time about equally between Europe and this country, and when in America lives at the Fifth Avenue hotel.

Though not a graduate of Columbia university, Mr. Loubat has long been its friend, and has in the past given it many valuable donations in the shape of books, manuscripts, etc. He has been extremely liberal to the Roman Catholic church, and Pope Leo XIII made him a count in 1881. In 1892 the pope elevated him to his present rank, and since then he has been known in aristocratic circles of the old world as the Duc de Loubat.

The chairman of the board of trustees said that the Loubat donation, with the \$1,000,000 given by President Low to construct the present library building as a memorial to Mr. Low's father, will place the library on an independent basis forever.
