REPORTS as to the results of using antitoxin in diphtheria continue to show its inestimable value in checking the disease. The City Physician of Vienna, Dr. Kammerer, recently made a report as to the results at tained with antitoxin down to the end of the year 1895 in the cities of Germany containing over fifteen thousand inhabitants. In the ten years from 1885 to 1895 there were 119,038 fatal cases of diphtheria and croup in these cities. On an average in the ten years under consideration, 10.60 people died of these diseases out of every 10,000. In 1895, the first year in which antitoxin came into general use, only 7,266 people died in these cities of diphtheria and croup; in other words, 5.4 out of every 10.-000 inhabitants. The mortality from diphtheria and croup for 1895, in comparison with the average for the ten preceding years, was reduced nearly one-half, and was 44 per cent, more favorable than in the best of those
