

But in case of a bombardment the foreign element might be put in Jeopardy along with the native population, unless ample time were given to foreigners to withdraw. There is no doubt this government would give ample time for foreigners to withdraw, and in case non-combatants it is usual to give at least 24 hours' notice of a bombard ment, but there might be serious dif-ficulty in the way of such notice in case the Spanish forts open fire on American ships, as it is hardly expected that the ships would remain under fire for 24 hours without returning the fire.


