



Hong Kong April 50.-It is denied that the Spanish fleet has left Manila to meet the American squadron. On the contrary, it is asserted that the Spanish warships will remain in Mana bay to assist the forts,

It is reported from Manila that the American warships have been sighted off Balinao, where the rebellion broke out last February, but the weather has been too stormy for the fleet to communicate with the rebels.

Commodore Dewey is accompanied y Jose Alexandrino, a prominent officer under Aguinaldo. Alexandrino has a magical influence in the Philippines, and will head the popular move ment to throw off the Spanish rule. A naval battle is expected at any hour






