Booming Hard Coal.

The enterprising and active business men of Mt. Carmel are meeting with much encouragement in their efforts to boom anthracite coal. They are receiving the moral and financial support of the business men of other towns, but so far the people of Shenandoah have taken no steps in that direction. They seem to have no interest in a movement which cannot help but be of benefit to every resident of this region, and especially to the business men.

A committee representing the Mt. Carmel Association visited Hazelton for the purpose of consulting with the business men of that city and to arrange for a convention to meet there in the near future to formulate a plan of action, and to get together representative men from every town in the region. In this manner co-operation can be effected and a united effort made to boom hard coal. The committee, having the matter in charge say they propose to push the boom vigorously and will not rest until they have enlisted delegates from every town in this and adjoining counties.

It will require a visit by the Mt. Carmel committee to awaken the business men of this town to a realization of what is for their own interests. Charters setting forth the object of the movement and requesting the formation of a local branch of the association have been received by probably all the local merchants, but so far no one has taken the initiative and started the movement. Shenandoah, above all other towns, should take an active interest in this question. We would suggest that the Mt. Carmel committee drop into town and awaken an interest here. Newspaper agitation doesn't seem to be effective.

Not only are business men interested in securing an equalization of tonnage rate for anthracite and bituminous coal from the railroads, but several prominent individual coal operators and many leading manufacturing concerns of New York and Philadelphia are back of the movement. These people realize that discrimination against hard coal interferes with their business by causing a decrease in sales. More work in this region means a corresponding increase in business for them.

The agitation of this question is to result in the appointment of a committee to interview the coal carrying companies, with a view to equalizing the rates of tonnage. The rate at which bituminous coal is hauled to Eastern points is entirely too low. If it was raised to enable the anthracite operators to get their product into the market at about the same rates, hard coal would be in greater demand and there would be more working days at the mines in this region. This is a fair proposition, consideration of which by the companies interested is all that is requested by those active in the movement.

If the business men at the head of the movement work along the right lines, much good must necessarily result to the anthracite coal trade, which at this time is sadly in need of a boom.

REVOLUTION FAILED.

Santo Domingo Rebels Repulsed at Monte Cristo.

Another Attempt Probable.

It would appear that the Panita, instead of having on board only 17 Dominicans, actually had 50 on board. The Panita arrived here on June 1, half empty, bringing from New York provisions for the army, which she landed at Matthewsburg, Great Inagua, Bahama Islands. She slipped away about 10 o'clock the same night and was in touch at Monte Cristo or at the nearby bay of Matthewsburg, which is alleged to be filled up the empty portion of her hold.

The captain of the Panita said the portion of her cargo which was not landed consisted of coal, but there was also a quantity of arms, which consisted of something very different from coal. The suspicions of the Spanish consul here were aroused. He denounced the taking on board the Panita of arms, and the vessel, without notice and without the permission of the Dominican consul, the Spanish consul ordered the Panita to be seized and taken to the bay of Matthewsburg. General Juan Yalderrama Jimenez and General Pablo Vallabona are believed to have been on board. The former has long been in the public eye in Santo Domingo, and was a candidate for the presidency. General Yalderrama fought bravely against President Henrquez's alleged usurpation and was exiled. He has been living at Great Inagua for some time, and the Panita is said to have been there in order to take him to sea.

According to the impression which prevails at Cape Haytien the Panita, when she left here, had a trial and sailing party of men on board and also carried a heavy supply of arms and ammunition. It is charged that she skillfully worked up the impression that she was engaged in an expedition to Cuba, and was going to Monte Cristo to take on board arms.

The first dispatch received here stated that the Panita arrived at Monte Cristo at 3 o'clock Thursday afternoon, and that the revolutionists had no difficulty in taking the town. It was stated further that the revolutionists, headed by Juan Yalderrama, General Yalderrama and Villanueva, they were marching on Puerto Plata, where another detachment was moving against Santiago de los Caballeros, the capital of the Dominican government.

Yesterday afternoon the Dominican consul here received a dispatch from the Panita stating that the attempted revolution at Monte Cristo had been defeated. That General Jimenez had been captured, and that the government troops, taking refuge on board the Panita and that all the others who landed, with the exception of three, had been killed.

Correspondents at Puerto Plata, cables to the effect that the revolutionists, who had been killed, five of the instruments were taken prisoners and shot yesterday morning. The others escaped. But though the revolutionists have been repulsed, it is believed another attempt will not be made. The fact that the Clyde company furnished the conspirators with a steamer is regarded as very significant of the completeness of the preparations, and the prospect of their success, since the Clyde Steamship company's concessions is the most valuable held under the Dominican government.

President Henrquez is said to have recently resumed the arbitrary execution of his opponents, sometimes openly, sometimes stealthily. The tragic disappearances of men of political note have been frequent of late in Dominican territory. President Henrquez is believed among the officers who have risen against the president.

LEADERS OF THE REVOLT.

Both Have Been Compulsive in Belief of Cuban Liberty.

New York, June 4.—The two principal leaders of the revolutionary attempt in the Dominican republic, J. L. Jimenez and General Augustin Morales, are well known in this country, particularly in New York city and Washington. Both of them have been conspicuous in their efforts to favor the Cuban cause.

Mr. Jimenez is a wealthy merchant, who had business at Monte Cristo, Haiti, Cape Haytien, Paris, Hamburg and New York. He came here very often, and his children were brought up in American schools. Mr. Jimenez has been active for many years from Santo Domingo by President Henrquez, who feared the influence exercised by the merchant.

General Morales, the other leader, who is reported to have been shot as well as he was captured, was the real organizer of this expedition, the third one he has led to free his country from the dictatorship of Henrquez. The latter named Morales more than he did any other of his enemies, and it was to be expected that he would show no mercy towards him. General Morales was a fighter, while Mr. Jimenez was the organizer as well as the financial backer of the expedition. Morales was only 55 years of age.

The Movement From Mobile.

Mobile, Ala., June 4.—The forward movement from Mobile began yesterday afternoon under command of General Bates. The first part of the Fourth army corps to leave camp was the Second cavalry, and this was quickly followed by the Third and the Twenty-first infantry. These men marched through the city to the water front, where the afternoon and part of the night were consumed in embarking on the transports. The Eleventh and the Ninth cavalry regiments were ordered to leave by rail for Tampa, but the order was countermanded.

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BURNED AT THE STAKE.

The Terrible Punishment Inflicted on a Slave in Louisiana.

Shreveport, La., June 4.—A thousand people gathered last night at Bayou, which is situated on the Victrola, Shreveport and Pacific railroads, about 18 miles from here, to witness the burning at the stake of William Street, a negro who attempted to ruin and murder Mrs. Durkin committed on the night of May 2. The people erected a post beside the railroad track, near the town, quickly laid the light wood and kindling saturated with coal oil, preparatory to placing Street in a post. Street was a negro of colored man of about 25 years of age. He confessed the crime to a colored minister, but said a white minister named John H. Smith was implicated.

He was tied to the stake, and uttered not a word as the great crackling flames shot up above his head. It was a ghastly sight which lasted for 15 minutes, after which a charred mass, well known lawless made speeches warning the crowd of negroes that such crimes as Street had committed would not be tolerated in this section of the State. He was buried in a shallow grave on the bank of the bayou, near the railroad track.
