THE CADIZ FLEET CAN TAKE ON COAL!

Privilege To Load Fuel From Transports at Port Said Has Been Granted By the Egyptian Government.

Can't Take His Destroyers Along!

General Shafter in Command at the Front—Santiago Outposts Taken by the Americans.

Port Said, June 30.—The government has given its sanction to the Spanish squadron from Cadiz coaling here from its own transports and Admiral Camara hopes to be able to proceed on his journey to the Philippines within twenty-four hours.

The Admiral has decided, however, to leave his torpedo boat destroyers behind.

It is practically impossible to take the destroyers across the Indian Ocean, as southwest monsoons are very heavy between Aden and Colombo.

GENERAL SHAFTER TO THE FRONT.

Santiago, June 30.—Major General Shafter is at the front and at present commanding.

The out-posts of Santiago are now in possession of the Americans, the Spaniards having evacuated them.

THE ST. PAUL MAY BE IN TROUBLE.

The American cruiser St. Paul left this port at seven o'clock yesterday morning to go direct to New York. It is feared she may have been surprised and is figuring in the battle.

ENGAGEMENT FOUGHT OFF PORTO RICO.

Washington, June 30.—A despatch from Point Salinas, Porto Rico, via Madrid, says that the steamer Antonio Lopez, one of the vessels of the Spanish Transatlantic Line, recently left Spain secretly with a cargo of big guns and other arms and ammunition and provisions for Porto Rico. She arrived off San Juan on Monday last, but was sighted by the American auxiliary cruisers St. Louis and St. Paul, which gave chase to her. The Lopez got away from the cruisers, but her Captain, fearing that more American warships were near, ran his vessel ashore, after which he caused one of her boilers to explode.

REPORT SCHLEY KILLED.

A Piece of Spanish "News" Which Has Caused Rejoicing Among Spaniards in Jamaica.

Kingston, Jamaica, June 30.—The Spanish consul here has received a cablegram from Santiago de Cuba asserting that the United States armored cruiser Brooklyn has been struck by a Spanish shell, which sank the vessel and killed Commodore Schley and 24 seamen. The consul really believes the "news," and the Spaniards all over the city are drinking champagne and rejoicing.

It has also been reported to the Spanish consul from Santiago that an extensive mine has been laid with which to blow up half of the American army when it enters the city.

Washington, June 30.—At 1:15 o'clock this morning, when officers on duty at the navy department were shown a copy of the above despatch,

they expressed disbelief in the story. Not a word has been received from Admiral Sampson, they said, since Tuesday night, and the officers regard it as certain that anything of the kind recounted in the dispatch happened the admiral would immediately have informed the department.

MAY BE BRIGADIERS.

Talk of Elevating Colonel Wood and Lieutenant Colonel Roosevelt, the Commanders of the Rough Riders.

Birmingham, Ala., June 30.—The Age-Herald prints a special dispatch from Greenville, Ala., the home of Judge Hobson, father of the hero of the Merrimac, giving a cablegram received from the cablegram reads: "Santiago de Cuba, June 28: My health continues good. Feel no uneasiness about me."

Fort Brower Captured.

Pottsville, June 30.—A battle royal has been waged between the contending forces of the Republican party to capture the prison wardenship. Up to the present time Warden Brower had successfully held the fort and repulsed the attacks of the enemy, but this week his faction received a set back by the court confirming the appointment of James H. Levan, of Mifflinville, as Warden. To-day the Levan forces were marshaled and scouts were sent out to watch the Brower citadel. The scouts reported the evacuation of the fort by Brower, the latter having left the prison temporarily. In his absence the enemy charged upon the fort, resulting in its capture and Levan at once installed himself as Warden. This was followed by reinforcements from one or two others of the new appointees who applied for admission and were admitted by order of commanding officer Levan.

Report on the Anthracite Boom Convention to be Received.

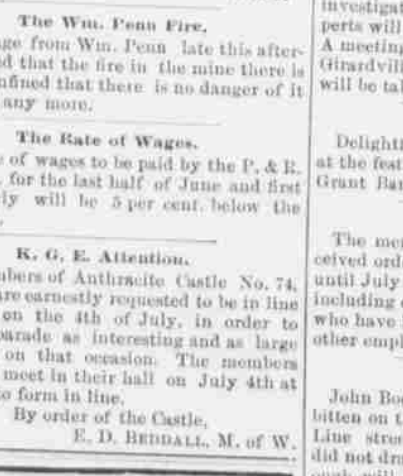

BOROUGH COUNCIL!

A Special Session Held to Arrange Some Financial Affairs.

TEMPORARY LOAN AUTHORIZED!

Salaries Paid in Advance of the Regular Meeting on Account of the Fourth of July—The Tax Lists Are to be Revised.

A special meeting of the Borough Council was held last evening for the purpose of making provision for interest on bonds falling due and salaries for the month of June. The members in attendance at the meeting were Messrs. McGuire, Lally, Straughlin, James, Brennan, Bell, Harkins, Hand, Nelwander and Cookley.

Mr. Hand, of the finance committee, stated that to meet the interest and other liabilities falling due, it would be necessary to negotiate a temporary loan of \$4,000 and upon motion Mr. Straughlin the proper officers were instructed to secure a loan for the amount stated for three months from one of the local banks.

Upon motion of Mr. Lally it was agreed, in consideration of the fact that the regular meeting of Council will not be held until after the Fourth of July, that the salaries of employees of the borough be paid.

Mr. Straughlin stated that for a number of years a large number of names that should not be there have been carried on the tax duplicates and, on account of this, the exonerations lists are much larger than they should be legitimately. He suggested that the finance committee should go over the lists with the Tax Receivers and Assessors of the respective wards and strike off the names of people who have died, become non-residents, etc.

It was decided, on motion of Mr. James, that the Committee of the respective wards go over the lists before the 1st of July and report written up and prepare for the finance committee a list of the names that should not appear.

Upon motion of Mr. Lally the name of Joseph Anderson was added to the list of special police.

Upon request of the Chief Burgess to withhold steps had been taken towards securing a pound for dogs and dogs Mr. Lally stated that the Shenandoah Fertilizer Company had very kindly offered the borough a piece of ground for the purpose free of charge, and the company's watchman will be near the offer and the only expense for the borough will be the building of eighty feet of fence to inclose the ground.

Mr. McGuire stated that William Snyder, of the First ward, performed work for the borough in 1897 to the amount of \$25 and that the street committee look the matter up, and it was so ordered.
