THE END OF WARFARE.

Russia's Czar Makes a Startling Proposal. AN INTERNATIONAL CONFERENCE

To Discuss the Need For Reduction in Armament. A CONSTANT MENACE TO PEACE.

The Czar's Note to the Powers Declares That the Continual Danger Which Lies in This Massing of War Materials...

The text of the note follows: "The maintenance of general peace and the possible reduction of the excessive armaments which weigh upon all nations present themselves in existing conditions to the world as an ideal toward which the endeavors of all governments should be directed."

International discussion is the most effectual means of ensuring all people's benefit—a real durable peace, above all, putting an end to the progressive development of the present armaments.

COMMITTEE OF CITIZENS

Will Meet This Evening to Consider the Increased Water Supply. OPINIONS OF DIFFERENT MEMBERS.

The committee of twenty-five appointed by Chairman Burns, as a result of the meeting of the taxpayers on Thursday evening, will meet in the Council chamber this evening for the purpose of taking such action on the question of increased water supply as in their judgment may be deemed advisable.

With these diversified opinions it will require some time for the committee to devise a feasible and economical plan of giving the borough an increased supply of water.

First Ward.—Frank McAndrew, Timothy O'Brien, Joseph Conhlin, John Berg, Zeph Robbins.

Second Ward.—John Burns, Michael O'Hara, James O'Hearn, T. F. Bradigan, T. F. Miles.

Fourth Ward.—James Bell, Supt. T. J. Mullhaly, James O'Hearn, Patrick Connors, Morgan Davies.

Fifth Ward.—Patrick McGuire, Christ Schmidt, Thomas Corville, James Hilbert, William Birt.

John Berg was no more positive in his comments, and qualified his statement as follows: "Providing the committee can give sufficient assurance that the borough will have an abundant supply of water for its consumers, and that the erection of the proposed storage reservoir will prove a profitable undertaking, I shall heartily advocate its construction. We must and ought to have more water."

Conversation upon the subject he said: "We have a good start, and let's make it better. The expenses incurred by the erection of another reservoir should be carefully considered before hasty and perhaps unwise action is taken."

T. F. Bradigan, the fifth member of the committee from the Second ward, is at Atlantic City, and his views upon the question could not be secured.

W. J. Higgins expressed his views as follows: "I am in favor of replacing the present storage reservoir on this side of the mountain so that it will hold water and can be used for the purpose for which it was erected. I am also in favor of more water, but it should be secured in an economical and legitimate way."

W. H. Glenn, of the lumber firm of Glenn & O'Hearn, made the suggestion that the committee of twenty-five visit the site of the proposed dam at Brandonville, and thus be in a position to act intelligently upon the question.

James J. Franey, a strong advocate of the borough water works and heavy taxpayer, defined his position as follows: "Should this proposed dam first and then repair the old one on this side of the mountain, I do not favor the ten per cent. force account system. We want more water, but let us obtain it in the most economical manner."

James Hillbert said he was in favor of securing an additional supply of water. He had no particular plan, but favored any plan the people may desire, so far as feasible. Speaking of the advisability of his appointment as a member of the committee he said: "I think it is improper to select me as a member of the committee, because of the position I hold."

Morgan Davis said he was favorable to a new dam being built on the site of the mountain, provided Council has sufficient money to carry on the work. He said we are sadly in need of more water.
