CONFLICT OF AUTHORITY.

Captain Duneau Held by a Sheriff For

Washington, Aug. 30.—Captain Louis C. Duncan, surgeon of the Twenty-sec-end Kansas regiment, is held by the sheriff of Fairfax county, Va., to answer an indictment charging him with descerating Confederate graves at Bull Run, near Manassas. It appears that Dr. Duncan, whose

case has now become famous, was not sentenced to five years' imprisonment. as reported from Camp Meade, Pa., but escaped much more lightly at the hands of the military court, there be-ing a lack of ovidence to prove that he actually took part in demolishing the graves. He was tried by court martial, and the finding of the court martial, approved by General Davis, was that Surgeon Duncan be deprived of his rank for two months, be confined to regimental camp and forfeit half his pay for the same length of time, and that he be reprimanded by the com-

How Mr. Duncan is to be confined to regimental camp for two menths, when he is now the prisoner of the sheriff at Pairfax county, is difficult to determine. His regiment has removed from Thoroughfare Gap to Camp Mende, Pa. R is understood that when the sheriff presented his warrant for him under the state indictment the surgeon was voluntarily surrendered. A clash between the state authorities and war department may develop, though the case has not been brought to attention in Washington as yet.

## HOME FOR HEALTH.

Stricken Pennsylvania Soldiers From Chickamauga Brought Back by the Governor.

Pittsburg, Aug. 30,-Over 200 soldiers who four months ago marched off to war, while thousands of admiring frier is cheered them on, returned yesterday amid anguish and tears. stricken heroes were aboard the Pennsylvania state hospital train, and are being taken to their homes and hos-pitals for better treatment. An hour was spent in removing a number of the sufferers to Pittsburg hospitals and giving dinner to the convalescents. There was no demonstration by the crowd when the train entered the sheds and tears came to the eyes of hundreds on the platform when they saw the gaunt faces of the sufferers from the windows. Governor Hastings and his wife were seated in the private car in the rear of the first section of the train.

Ninety tin basins with towels and soap and barrels of warm water were provided by the railroad company and the convalescent who were able were marched from the cars and anowed to make their tollet with a baggage truck

for a dreaser.
Mrs. Hastings, with tears in her eyes. was a witness of the sad scenes when the sufferers were removed on stretchers to the ambulances. She accompanied the train on the entire trip and assisted the nurses in their work, "f shall not accompany the governor on his next trip to the camp," she said. "I am unused to such scenes of suf-tering, and I have suffered extremely from nervousness while returning from Chickamauga. I am grateful for an opportunity to do my share in alleviating the suffering of our brave soldiers, but am more than thankful that this war

am more than thankful that this war and its sacrifices are at an end." President McKinley passed through Pittsburg on his way from Somerset, Pa., to Cleveland at 2:30 o'clock in the afternoon. An immense crowd was at the station and the president was enthusiastically greeted. The Pennsylvania hospital train was met at Greensburg, and the train bearing the presidential party was stopped while the president made an inspection of the hospital train and shook hands with the sick soldiers.
