David Malone to-day left town for Philadelphia, to resume his studies at the University of Pennsylvania.
Hon. S. A. Losh, of Schuylkill Haven, was a town visitor last night.

Volunteer Max and Egle, Constable (Hibson) and Chief Burgess Tabor were in attendance at the criminal court as witnesses yesterday.
Martin Donaherty, a fireman on the United States auxiliary engine St. Louis, is visiting relatives in town.
Misses Daisy, Minnie and Priscilla Borer and Kate Devine, of Gilberton, accompanied by Harry Lindick, of Palmyra, N. J., spent yesterday as guests of Mr. and Mrs. William Johnson, of South Jarrin street.
Joseph Hendrick, of New Philadelphia, who claims the distinction of having been the only Polish delegate at the recent Republican county convention, was a visitor to town to-day.

Among the Soldiers.
John H. Fugle, of Wm. Penn, a private of Company F, Eighth Regiment, who was lame on a six days' furlough to attend the funeral of his father-in-law, William Franz, returned to Camp Meade this morning.
Word has been received from Porto Rico to the effect that Private W. C. Brownmiller, of Company F, Eighth Regiment, who was returned to duty. It was reported last week that the young soldier had died of fever.
The War department has issued orders, with increased emphasis, that there will be no more volunteers mustered out, and efforts in this direction will be of no avail.
Missesville is making great preparations to welcome the soldiers home next Friday evening.

Word has been received from Philadelphia to the effect that the Schuylkill county soldiers are doing well. Dr. A. C. Morgan, of town, is one of the attending physicians. The Potomac hospital contains six soldiers. An effort is being made to recover all of Schuylkill's sick soldiers to that institution.
It is rumored that the Fourth Regiment, just returned from Porto Rico, will shortly rendezvous at Mt. Grotto.

Adjutant Milton Brome, of St. Clair, of the Schuylkill County Battalion, Eighth Regiment, P. V. L., arrived home from Camp Meade on Saturday night last, and is now ill with fever.

Joseph Peters, of town, one of the volunteers who returned from Porto Rico with the Fourth Regiment, visited Potomac on Monday to attend the funeral of his late grandfather at Tumbling Run, under the auspices of the Women's Auxiliary of the Potomac hospital. While there he was taken sick and was confined to the hospital, and has since been removed to that institution. A telephone message to the Herald this afternoon says he is developing pneumonia, but his condition to-day was favorable, and that he will probably recover.

Fingers broken.
Martin Murphy, of Mahanoy City, employed as a leader at the North Mahanoy colliery, lost two fingers of his left hand and broken this morning while repairing a shaft.

Forty Hours Devotion.
The services of Forty Hours Devotion is now in progress in St. Fidelis' German Catholic church in Mahanoy City and attracting large attendances. A number of visiting clergymen are officiating at the services.

Better Food Supply.
Visitors returning from Camp Meade, near Harrisburg, report that the difficulties which existed there in reference to the food supply have been removed and the food is now excellent and served generously.

Imports and Exports.
Washington, Sept. 14.—The monthly statement of the imports and exports of the United States for August shows the imports of merchandise to have aggregated \$49,178,844, a decrease, as compared with August, 1897, of about \$2,500,000. Of the imports during August \$21,259,692 were free of duty. The August exports of domestic merchandise amounted to \$5,532,878, an increase of nearly \$4,000,000. The imports of gold amounted to \$6,822,627, and the exports to \$1,955,908.

Ambassador Hay Homeward Bound.
Liverpool, Sept. 14.—The White Star line steamer Teutonic, which sailed from this port for New York today, has among her passengers Colonel John Hay, the retiring United States ambassador to Great Britain, and Mrs. Hay; J. B. Ansell, the retiring United States minister to Turkey, and family; James A. Hurden, Mr. and Mrs. Bancroft Davis, J. W. Doane and Mr. and Mrs. George J. Gould.

The Case Against Mrs. Botkin.
San Francisco, Sept. 14.—The habeas corpus proceedings in the Botkin case was postponed until next Monday. The matter of the extradition will be heard tomorrow by Governor Budd. Chief of Police Lees received a telegram yesterday from Attorney General White, of Delaware, stating that experts had positively identified the writing in the note which was enclosed in the box of bonbons as that of Mrs. Botkin.

Three Killed at a Crossing.
Wichita, Kan., Sept. 14.—Three persons were killed outright and several others badly injured here last night, when a carryall at the Douglas avenue crossing was struck by a Rock Island passenger train. In the carryall were 13 persons. The team was going at a rapid pace and the driver could not stop at the crossing when he saw that the train was upon it. The dead are: Mrs. Sarah Avery, Wichita; Mrs. W. H. Ford, Wichita; John Cherry, Mulvane. Another woman, name unknown, was probably fatally injured.

Furloughs For Jewish Soldiers.
New York, Sept. 14.—Adjutant General Corbin, of the United States army, has consented, and issued orders that 4,000 Jewish volunteers, who had either joined volunteer regiments or had seen furlough at the front during the late Spanish-American war, should receive furloughs to enable them to participate in the celebrations of the orthodox Jewish congregational union of America.

Young Couple Drowned While Boating.
New York, Sept. 14.—The bodies of Joseph Feldman, of Newark, N. J., and Miss Kate Oates, of Orange, were found in the Passaic river yesterday. Police Officer Miss Oates had gone boating together on the river on Saturday, without telling their friends of their plan. How the accident occurred that cost them their lives is not known. The bodies were found a mile apart.

Postal Clerks For Porto Rico.
New York, Sept. 14.—Fourteen postal clerks left New York today on the Berlin to fill positions in the service in Porto Rico. The postal commission now in the island will designate the places where these clerks will be employed. The men selected for the work have all had experience in postal affairs, and were taken from post offices in all parts of the country.

Grotto has been broken for the new Schuylkill Memorial church at Lebanon.
The Colored Old Fellows, of Pennsylvania, are holding a convention at Altoona.
A filtration plant, with a capacity of 4,000,000 gallons a day, will be introduced at York.

Fifty hundred students are enrolled at the Bloomsburg State Normal School, which opened yesterday.
At Wilkes-Barre, Andrew Condit was convicted of manslaughter for killing his friend, Andrew Sabol, in a drunken quarrel.
A Lehigh Valley engine at Easton struck the engine of the Lehigh Valley, of Philadelphia, breaking several of his ribs and injuring him internally.

George W. Reed, an Eastern diver, was yesterday sentenced by Judge Scott to seven years in the Eastern Penitentiary for criminal assault on his 14-year-old step-daughter.

POLITICAL POINTS.

Shenandoah's vote on Poor Director was seven for Middleton and five for Carter, the latter receiving the votes of Dove, Hart and Gale. Delegate Morris was credited with voting for the latter, but he supported Middleton.
There is strong talk of an independent ticket in the Fourth Legislative district. Shenandoah was credited with politicians to-day, the Schuylkill convention being the subject.
The First Legislative district convention will meet in Mahanoy City to-morrow morning, the candidates being B. J. Yost, of town; W. H. Brown, of Lavigne, and Mr. B. H. of Mahanoy City. The latter leads in the number of delegates.
William Downing, of Jacksons, who was running for delegate at Saturday's primaries and who was defeated, appeared before Judge May, in Mahanoy City, last evening, and swore out a warrant for the arrest of the election board charging them with a violation of the election laws. The men accused are James Talaney, Henry Gussick and Jacob Bendish. They each furnished \$500 bail to appear at court. No vote were recorded for Downing, although he voted himself and was compelled by the board to swear that he would support the ticket.

Andrew Conway, Capt. William Jones, two prominent Mahanoy City Republicans, were interested in to-day's convention as Graham boomers.
James McCool, who can get most anything he wants in Mahanoy township, was on hand to-day.
Frank D. Bowman, Dr. W. N. Stein and S. G. Middleton, candidates for Surveyor, Coroner and Poor Director respectively, were noticed among the spectators at to-day's convention.
The contest for County Chairman is causing much interest among the Republican factions. The fact that it will be a short campaign, many are trying the selection of the present incumbent, A. L. Shay. Mr. Brumm is "grooming" George Patterson, of Ashland.

The election in this town next February for borough officers will be the most interesting held for many years.
The Legislative convention at Mahanoy City to-morrow will prove interesting.
W. W. Lewis, of Mahanoy City, was here to-day and mingled with the delegates.
The First Legislative district convention will have 49 votes, 23 being necessary to a choice.
