### The Comal's Cargo.

Washington, Sept. 21.—The Acting Secretary Melkovich is making renewed efforts to secure the entrance of the steamer Comal with the million rations on board into some Cuban port. The Comal is now at Key West, where she was ordered when the Spanish authorities refused to allow her to land her cargo without the payment by the United States of duty to the amount of \$60,000 in gold. Unofficial advice has been received that the port of Bahia Honda is opened for relief without the payment of duty. Secretary Melkovich is now making an inquiry as to whether the Comal's relief supplies can be landed. Senator Quintero, of the Cuban junta, represents the Cubans as being in a sad plight.

### Ex-Secretary Sherman Ill.

Washington, Sept. 21.—Hon. John Sherman is ill at his residence in this city from an acute attack of bronchitis. He has been in bed for about a week, but progressed favorably until three days ago, when there was a slight relapse. Today, however, he is reported as being better, though somewhat weak, and with a little fever. His condition is not regarded as at all dangerous.

### Yale's Monster Football.

New Haven, Sept. 21.—The most interesting feature of yesterday's football practice was the strength of the college line, which held the varsity rushers for three downs on the one yard line. An amusing feature of the situation is that Conna, the much-talked-of candidate for center, cannot find a football suit large enough to fit his generous proportions. A special jersey and breeches are being made for him.

### POLITICAL POINTS.

The Republican nominees will meet in Pottsville to-morrow afternoon for the purpose of selecting a county chairman. Among the names mentioned for the position are: A. L. Shay, the present chairman; David W. Payne, who was chairman several years ago; Clerk of the Courts John T. Shener, who is no novice in political life; Charles C. Martin, George R. Patterson, of Ashland; Harrison Hall, of Mahanoy City, and Dr. Charles E. Quail, of Auburn.

It is now Sub-Treasurer John F. Finney, and few there are in Schuylkill who will not send up their cards when visiting Philadelphia.

Harry Becker, the independent Democratic candidate for the Legislature in the Second district, sounds his own praises, by incidentally booming hard coal. It is dollars to doughnuts that Harry will not attach the prefix Hon. to his name.

If you desire to vote at the next election your taxes must be paid before October 1st.

The general good does not underestimate the enemy's strength. The Republicans, therefore, would do well to keep an eye on Swallow. Our Democratic friends should accept the same advice.

The Ashland News, a Democratic paper, is expected to be put into the camp of our firing line by the end of the month.

The Prohibitionists of the county have entered the campaign in earnest, and from what their leaders say it is inferred that they expect to carry a large vote in November, especially for their candidate for Governor, Dr. Silas Swallow. On Friday next representatives of the party will meet at Schuylkill Haven for the purpose of nominating a full county ticket. Nomination papers are now being circulated to enable them to have their tickets appear on the ballot.

United States Sub-Treasurer John F. Finney, yesterday made his first appointment. He selected ex-Bank Examiner Charles F. Deniger as a special representative accountant in auditing the accounts of the sub-treasury and counting the funds. This position is only temporary.

How many candidates do you think will appropriately celebrate Thanksgiving Day, on the Democratic side?

John Wannaker's speeches, against the Republican administration in this state, have been published in book form, and will be given wide distribution.

Seven Republican factions in Philadelphia have at last reached an agreement on a county ticket, and the friends of Martin and Durban now dwell together in harmony—for the time being, at least.

At the instance of Senator Quay, K. B. Brown, editor of the Meadville Democrat, was held for court under bonds for \$300. The charge is libel. The alleged libelous article is said to have been published in the New York Voice.

Here's a prediction: S. B. Edwards, the Republican candidate for District Attorney, will lead the ticket.

Seven Republican ward leaders to be started on the Republican ticket are: District 1, in the Seventeenth Congressional District, serve through the campaign, Centralia, Berwick, Dunmore, Berwick, Mainville, Sunbury and Shamokin are the chosen spots.

James Muir, of Pottsville, is treasurer of the Business Men's League, organized to defeat Senator Quay.

### BOWERS GUILTY.

After Deliberating Six Hours the Jury Renders a Verdict.

Last yesterday afternoon the jury in the case of John Bowers charged with killing Joseph Astronsky, brought in a verdict of "guilty of murder in the second degree." Counsel for the defendant made no motion for a new trial, and Bowers was taken back to jail. The defendant in this case, had, with his brother, stabbed Astronsky on the street in Mahanoy City, late Saturday night, July 25. They wanted the man to treat them to a drink and he refused. Then Bowers drew a pocket knife and stabbed him in the neck. Astronsky was taken to his home and several days later was removed to the Miners' hospital where he died. Bowers was formerly a resident of this town.
