# GEN. WOOD HAS WOES!

His Troubles With the Cubans Who Are After Office.

FACTIONS FIGHTING FOR PLACE.

Although Admitting That the Mayor of Manzanillo Is Competent and Was a Brave Cubau Soldler, General Rios Demands His Dismissal. Manzanillo, Oct. 31.-The visit of Gen-

eral Leonard Wood, governor of the military department of Santiago, has been instrumental in bringing all the elements among the Cubans to the front. No fewer than 2,000 insurgents, of whom 500 are officers, want offices, wn Saturday and while walking along and their clamor amounts almost to a There are two leading factions, one headed by General Jeaus Rabi and the

other by General Rios. At present most of the offices are held by representatives of the Rabi faction, including the mayoralty and the custom house inspectorships. General Wood, in order to pacify the Ries faction, has give them six positions on the rural pe force and turned over to one of their people the lighthouse at Cape Cruz, t gether with several other minor pointments. But neither party is su isfled, each thinking that it ought in have all the offices. General Rios does not dare express his opinion public of General Rabi, but he feels that thi is his district, as he has had the nomi-nal charge of it for three years, and that it ought to belong to him, so far as appointments of Cubans to office ar concerned, and all the more so because he represents General Calixto Garcia.

The majority of the insurgents her have no money and go about livin from hand to mouth and wonderin what will happen next. Armed me are not allowed rations. As the Co bans will not disband, and will no work, nothing remains for them to strut about the city, with machate and revolvers. Some of them are nealy naked, others appear in long legge patent leather boots with silver spur carrying superbly wrought Toledo a chetes. A few wear imaculate wh sults and panama hate. Except when he is on board the gun boat Hist, which brought him here General Wood is besieged by thes seekers for office. Among the inter-views he has had was one with General Rios, who wanted the mayor of Manzanillo, one of Rabi's faction, dis missed and his own man appointed to the mayoralty.
