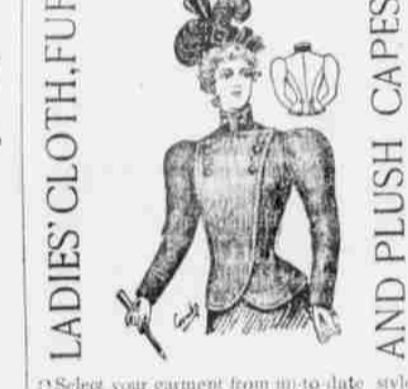
APPEAL FOR AID.

The Pottsville Hospital Asks for Assistance in Its Good Work.
Pottsville, Pa., Nov. 8.
ED. HENSLIN: The Pottsville Hospital has just sent out the enclosed appeal to the churches of Schuylkill county for their annual contribution towards its support. The expenses of the care of those in the institution have been greatly increased due to the number of soldiers taken care of there in addition to the regular patients. There have been eighty soldiers treated; of these sixty were brought from Camp Meade, while twenty have come in from points in the county. The average time each soldier is in the hospital is thirty days and the average cost \$1.00 per day. The eighty soldiers will cost \$2,400.00.
The Women's Auxiliary have in various ways raised a fund for the care of sick soldiers, amounting to \$1,000.00. In addition there has been expended for train service, for additional equipment, such as blankets, clothing, beds, fever tents and linen, more necessary by increased work, \$200.00, leaving but \$200.00 to be raised elsewhere. This represents the cost of maintenance, including fuel, light, food, medicine, wages and salaries.
There is still due a balance on new building erected last year. We are fully equipped but our hospital, whereas heretofore thirty-five was our limit. We have had no patients at one time, and during October our average has been 47 each day.

A Short Business Session Held in Town Yesterday.
