

FLEMMING PARDONED.

Evening (**)

The Young Man Was Released and Arrived Home Last Evening.

Some time ago the HERALD contained an item to the effect that the Board of Pardons had decided to grant a pardon for Michael Flemming, of this town, upon receipt of a letter recommending the same from the trial Judge, who in this instance was Hon R. H. Koch. That letter was subsequently received and yesterday Flemming was released from prison, and arrived home last evening. The young man met with a hearty reception

at the hands of his numerous friends.

It will be remembered that Flemming was with three others, found guilty at the March term of court of being implicated in the inecndiarism at Mahanoy City, and sentenced to pay \$25 fine, costs and undergo imprison-ment. The evidence produced showed that he was not altogether guilty, and there were extenuating circumstances in his favor, which caused the prosecutors to use their efforts to secure his pardon, and the trial judge joined them in that respect. S. B. Edwards, Esq. pleaded his case before the Board of Pardons The HERALD was to-day in receipt of the following letter, which speaks for itself:
