THE HOLIDAY RECESS.

It Will Begin on Wednesday or Thursday of This Week.

CHANCES OF THE PEACE TREATY.

It will be taken up early in January, and probably will be promptly passed. With the Philippines Question Reserved for Future Settlement Washington, Dec. 19.—The week in the senate will be opened with a speech by Senator Platt, of Connecticut, on the question of expansion. He has given notice of an address to begin immediately after the conclusion of the routine morning business today. Mr. Platt will reply to the speech of Senator Vest made last Monday, and as he has given very careful attention to the extension of our territorial area no little interest is manifested among senators in his presentation of the matter, and it is not improbable, unless the Nicaragua bill prevents, that the speech will precipitate a more or less general debate upon this question. Whether it does or not a number of speeches on the same subject will be made after the Christmas holidays, preparatory to the consideration of the peace treaty.

It is believed that the treaty will be taken up for discussion early in January. Already there is talk of the probability of disposing of the treaty during the present session, and the impression is favorable to this result. A few senators worry themselves with the debate to the treaty at length, and some profess unalterable opposition, but the feeling is so strong against an extra session and in favor of the postponement of the settlement of the disposition of the Philippines after they come into our possession that it now seems that even the minority will consent to the treaty's ratification without material delay.

Friends of the treaty, who are giving attention to the closet details of opposition as they develop themselves, have taken the pains to have enumerated the names of the signers to the memorials against annexation which have reached the senate, and they find that there are fewer than 2,000 of them, distributed among the states as follows: Massachusetts, 1,435; West Virginia, 191; Indiana, 74; Ohio, 50; Florida, 47; New York, 45; Virginia, 39; Vermont, 20; Maryland, 18; Pennsylvania and Illinois, 15 each; Rhode Island, 12; New Hampshire, 6; California and Missouri, 3 each; Wisconsin and Tennessee, 2 each; Maine, Colorado and Nevada, 1 each.

Senator Morgan said today that he meant to press the Nicaragua canal bill as vigorously as possible, and he expressed the hope that he might get a vote before Wednesday, the probable date of the Christmas adjournment. The indications are, however, against such an early disposal of the subject, and it may be accepted as quite certain that even if Senator Turpie's motion for postponement till Jan. 10 should be rejected, the bill will be naturally thrown over beyond the holidays. It is evidently the purpose of the opposition to prevent action during the few remaining days prior to adjournment.

The holiday recess, by the terms of the resolution reported by the ways and means committee of the house, is to begin Thursday and extend until Wednesday, Jan. 4. It is likely, however, that the Christmas adjournment, so as to make the recess begin on Wednesday instead of Thursday. The appropriation bills are farther advanced now than they have been for many years at the short session. Already the naval and army deficiencies a special bill, and three of the regular bills—the pension, District of Columbia and Indian—have passed the house. The friends of the naval personnel bill and the bill for the Philadelphia exposition of 1899 have been urging the senate to grant their requests for their consideration. Time will be allotted for the former bill soon after the house reconvenes after the holiday recess. It is possible that the Philadelphia exposition bill may be called up and placed upon its passage today. The bill to extend the navigation laws of the United States over Hawaii, which was pending on Saturday when the house adjourned, may also be voted on under suspension of the rules.

PRESIDENT'S SUNDAY.

Where the Nation's Leaders Attended Divine Services.

VISIT TO A COLORED COLLEGE.

The President Delivers an Address to the Students of the Georgia State Agricultural and Mechanical College.

Savannah, Ga., Dec. 19.—Notwithstanding yesterday was supposed to be a day of rest with the presidential party, it was, as a matter of fact, filled with interest and activity. Though they had not left yet the banquet Saturday night, it was nearly 7 o'clock when General Wheeler delivered his delightful peroration to "Women"—the president and accompanying members of his cabinet arose to breakfast at about the usual hour and later they separated to attend divine services.

President McKinley attended church at the Wesley Memorial Methodist church. Mrs. McKinley did not accompany him. She is suffering from a slight cold and remained at the hotel. Her indispositions, however, does not amount to real illness, and in the afternoon she was able to take a carriage ride about the city.

The president was met at the door of the church by leading members of the congregation, who escorted him to the pew reserved for him. As he entered the congregation arose and remained standing until he had taken his seat. The sermon was by Rev. John A. Thomas D.D., dean of the college and to the distinguished presence during the service, beyond an invocation by the preacher for divine guidance for the president during the crisis which now confronts the country.

Secretary Alger and General Shafter attended the First Presbyterian church and after the service held an informal levee in the aisles, many persons crowding around them to shake hands and utter words of appreciation and encouragement to the men.

Secretary Alger and General Shafter also visited the camp. Secretary Alger paid more attention to the camp than any other member of the party. He went through several of the regimental villages from headquarters to kitchens, and made an examination. He also visited the hospital of the First division, where he spoke kindly to the sick men and made inquiries into their wants and how they were supplied. After his trip he expressed himself as very much gratified with the camp and the work of the hospital corps.

Postmaster General Shafter and the newspaper correspondents with the presidential party were the guests of the officers of the Third battalion, Third Georgia regiment, at the camp yesterday afternoon. An order dinner was given by Postmaster General Smith made a short address, during the course of which he paid a high tribute to the press for its integrity.

General Shafter made an impromptu conversation at the dining table assembled, which was full of good wishes, and at once placed the general in touch with all of his hearers.

General Shafter did not make a speech, but in a conversational way expressed himself, his remarks being informally addressed to Colonel Bower, of the Georgians, though they were intended for the whole assembly.

"It seems to me," said General Shafter, "that a great advantage has been an erroneous idea respecting our relations with the Cubans. As I view it, we have taken Spain's war upon our selves. We shall in all probability hear a great deal more of the insurrectos."

"How about self government for the Cubans?" General Shafter was asked. "Self government," the general repeated; "why, they are no more fit for self government than gunpowder is for blasting."

After the dinner the party made an inspection of the camps. Without exception, the visitors pronounced the arrangements excellent.

The members of the visiting party spent the evening at the party given at the hotel until the time came for them to depart for Macon, for which place their train left at midnight. On the way to the depot the president was greeted with hearty cheers, as indeed he has been every time the train comes within sight during his visit here.

King Oscar Seriously Ill. London, Dec. 19.—The Copenhagen correspondent of The Daily Mail says that King Oscar II of Sweden and Norway was suddenly taken ill and is now confined to his bed. King Oscar, who is the great grandson of Napoleon's famous general Beresford, was born Jan. 31, 1829, and succeeded to the throne April 18, 1872, on the death of Charles XV. He married in June, 1857, the Princess Sophia of Nassau, daughter of the late Duke Wilhelm of Nassau. From this union there are four sons.
