

Assembly Counsels Patience. Havana, Jan. 27 .- Rumor has been in circulation during the last few days that the United States will lend \$3,-000,000, to be applied in part payment of arrears of pay claim by the Cuban soldiery. It has provoked some strong criticism, the argument being that if the customs were in the hands of the Cubans the first thing done would be to pay the Cuban soldiery in full, and that the United States, holding ample customs receipts as security, could advance more than \$2,000.000,
