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THE COUNTY FINANCES.

Controller Snyder's Statement Filed Late Yesterday Afternoon.

The annual statement of the County Controller's office for the year 1898 was filed with the County Commissioners yesterday by former Controller Charles A. Snyder.

There was expended during the year for all county purposes, \$711,450.48. The office began business on January 1, 1898, with a balance of \$32,457.84 for all purposes.

The statement shows that the several departments of the county were in careful hands last year and that the responsibility of Mr. Snyder, as Controller, was of a character that reflects great credit upon himself and will be pleasing to the taxpayers.

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RIOTOUS NEGRO TROOPS

Almost Precipitate a Bloody Race Riot at Texarkana, Ark.

TRAIN HELD FOR SEVEN HOURS.

No Arrests Were Made, However, and the Train Proceeded—At Iuka, Miss., the Ammunition Car Was Burned and Three Women Are Reported Killed.

Texarkana, Ark., Feb. 1.—There passed through Texarkana yesterday eight train loads of negro soldiers, 1,200 in number, composing the Tenth United States Cavalry, en route to San Antonio. When they arrived here several of them were intoxicated.
