Destitution Following Crop Failure Exists in Nine Countles.

Washington, Feb. 2.-Ambassado Hitchcock, from St. Petersburg, has reported to the state department on the famine conditions prevailing in certain parts of Russia. The report is taken from the statement of the Red Cross society in the official gazette. Ambasandor Hitchcock says that before trans-

mitting the report in question he call-ed upon the minister of foreign affairs ascertain whether the report as set forth was accurate, and whether or no imperial government would carry to have the matter brought to the at-

tention of the public in America, with the view of enlisting the sympathies and action of our people who respond ed so generously to a call made upon them under similar conditions several years ago. Count Mouravief stated that the report might be considered official


Two Killed in Texas Duct.


