## AGUINALDO'S OFFER.

Willing to Release Spanish Prisoners For \$500,000 and Their Arms.

Madrid, Feb. 6.-It is announced that arrangements for the repatriation of Spanish troops in the Philippine Islands are being made at New York and San Francisco. The American government, it is added, bears the expense ried out by the Spanish Transatiantic Steamship company. The Spanish gov ernment, through the French embasss at Washington, has sent a communi tion to the government of the United States saying that, in view of nonsuccess of the Americans to obtain the release of the Spanish prisoners, the government itself has taken stens to obtain their release. But as this will necessitate a certain expense the govthe stipulations of the treaty of Paris bilge the Americans to obtain the liberation of the Spanlards,

General Ries, commanding the Spanish troops in the Philippines, cables that Aguinaldo offers to release the Spanish prisoners on the payment of \$500,000 and the handing over to him of the cannon, rifles and 3,000,000 cartridges belonging to the Spaniards, The government here replied that it could not accept this transaction, as it would he equivalent to indirect protection of the insurgents, which would be a breach of the Spanish engagements with the United States.

GEN, WOOD RETURNS TO DUTY

The Military Commander of Santiago Spoils a Projected Demonstration of Welcome by Arriving Unexpectedly. Will Be Honored at a Mass Meeting.

Santiago de Cuba, Feb. 6.-An order received here from Havana has not tended to relieve the situation or to concile the people to being ruled om a distance. Under its terms a duceion of 20 per cent is being made in all salaries exceeding \$600 per an-This is really an old Spanish tax, always exceedingly obnoxious and only used as an extreme war measure. It does not touch the laboring class, but strikes those who have most in-fluence over the working people, the mayors, chiefs of gendermerle and

judges in the province. These officials bitterly protest against the injustice of this reduction, for General Leonard Wood, military governor of the department of Santiago, when reorganizing these offices reduced. the salaries paid under the Spanish regime quite 80 per cent on the aver-age, and 50 per cent in some instances. Moreover, these reductions were in-variably made before appointing the incumbents. Under the Spanish government the mayor of Santiago received \$250 a month. General Wood reduced the amount to \$100, believing this all the city could afford and arguing that a good citizen ought to be willing to undertake the mayoralty duties on that basis for the benefit of the people of the city.
