There appears to be no limitation to the industrial uses of cottonseed oil, and these of course are multiplied by the con-stantly developing improvements made in the refining processes. A marked advance in this last respect is that the yellow oll resulting from the first refining process through treatment with alkaline solu

tions, is now further purified by heating and filtration: then the white oil of commerce is obtained by shaking the yellow oil with 2 to 3 per cent of fuller's earth. In purifying the yellow oil about 35 per cent of it is separated in the form of stearin, and the latter is employed in making candles, etc.

cottonseed oil there is likewise made a peculiar kind of wash powder. The soap itself made from the oil is used extensively by the woolen mills of this and other countries, and it has been found to be of special value in washing woolen goods, which does not injure them nor cause them to shrink. After all, however, not much more than one-third of the cotton-

seed supply is at present used for manu facturing oil and similar products.

It swallowed the people who tried to escape and rendered itself further obnoxious by poisoning the weils with its splitle. Finally the serpent was destroyed by a stratagem. It was so huge that when the people laid its body out in death it stretched over more than 20 arrow flights. Indeed when thrown into the river it was too large to pass the rocks, so that it became wedged in between them, and the waters rose over it, thus fashion ing the horseshoe, which remains to this

The Cherokees are very much afraid of certain mythical horned alligators which are supposed to reside in several different places in deep holes in the rivers. There is one locality in Oklahoma where a crea-ture of this description has an underground tunnel from one river to another. 
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
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
