THE brief synopsis of the annual report of Mine Inspector Stein, published in our edition of last evening. was read with a great deal of interest by those employed in and about the mines. It is certainly creditable both to the Inspector and those in charge of the operations that twenty-six per cent. less fatal accidents occurred last year than in 1897, and one less nonfatal accident.

The "Pennsy's" Report.

The annual report of the Pennsylvania Railroad Company shows that the affairs of this great corporation are in a most prosperous condition. The facts and figures of the report are most interesting and instructive, and show that the officials of the company have displayed business ability of the highest order in the management of the great interests committed to their care.

Extensive improvements have been made in straightening main lines, increasing the number of tracks in important sections and improving stations at terminal points in large cities, among others the ferry station at Delaware river. Other large operations of similar kind are planned at terminal stations in New York, Pittsburg and elsewhere.

Everything indicates not only a conservative policy in many things, but a wide-awake comprehension of the business demands for essential improvements in order to the greater accommodation of the public and the more rapid transaction of business.

Compulsory Voting.

Mr. Grady has introduced a bill in the Senate at Harrisburg providing for compulsory voting, any citizen neglecting to exercise his right of franchise without good cause being subject, under the terms of the measure, to a fine of five dollars, which shall go into the public school fund. Perhaps the spirit which prompts

this measure is wise, but it is not clear that the proposed law would be of any practical benefit. A good citizen will never neglect to cast his vote, while all the laws that the Legislature might pass could not reform a bad citizen, who would continue to tor that this paymaster will be undesirable, even though he cast do his duty. his vote to save the amount of the

Voting is a precious privilege, valued by all lovers of free popular government. The man who values his citizenship will never forego this privilege, and the man who does not cannot by any law be made to discharge his duties as a citizen in the comprehensive manner which is to be desired. He may vote, but he will vote without interest, mechanically, listlessly, like a machine. Votes so cast are more dangerous to the state than votes withheld.

True, the man who enjoys all the privileges of citizenship and refuses to discharge the one supreme duty is rather a drag on the state, but that is one of the things which a free government must submit to.

The Scranton Companies In and Others May Be Acquired,

New York, March 9. The Evening Post, referring to the removed coal com-bination and J. Pierpont Morgan's con-

nection with it, says:
"The union of the Scranton coal com panies is believed to have been effected through deposits of their stock with the Guaranty Trust company, of this city. The purchase of these companies is part of a comprchensive plan for control of the anthracite output, and while it is said that no more independent collieries are at present the subject of negotiathe Scranton mines were first taken un-der control because of the dangerous proportions which the proposed independent anthracite line had assumed, and that others will be taken if the projectors of the plan for uniting the anthracite outpo see any endangering of their plans for maintaining prices on a profitable basis "Negotiations are known to be in prog

The much improved demand for anthracite coal and the advance in prices mak it possible for the coal roads which own a large proportion of their collieries to get the benefit of the improved situation. If independent operation could come in and cut prices some of the rallways might feel compelled to meet the cut, and then there would be no profit for

anybody in the industry.
"The visir of J. P. Morgan to Engfund has been taken as having bearing on the coul deal. It was stated today by those in a position to know that Mr Morgan's visit had no relation to any such move, nor is his return to be made the occasion for any definite announce ment of a coal combination."

BRUTAL CHINESE CANNIBALS.

Awful Treatment of a Belgian Pries

by the Flends. Vancouver. B. C., March 9.—Chinese papers received by the steamer Empres of India give details of the murder and torture of a Roman Cathelic priest near Ichang. The priest was Father Victor-lan Jean Delbrouck, a Belgian. He was captured by thleves, who tied him up and fiendishly tortured him. One accountages that as the priest hung from the tree to which he was tied pieces were cut from his thighs and eaten by tormenters. From the state of his body fire was evidently applied to it and slugs were fired into the more vital parts. Finally his body was cut open from the chest to the bottom of the abdomen, he was disembowled and var lons organs were taken out and catan by these so-called semi-civilized people who at the same time drank his blood He was also mutilated in a way that cannot be described, and his head cut off, there being a hole in the top of his skull large enough to put one's fist in.

DONALDSON'S LAST DIVE.

fhree Thousand Witness Ris Fatal Plunge at Madison Square Garden. New York, March 9 .- Thomas Donaldson, of Bath Beach, L. I., known the world over as a champion high diver, dove from the roof of Madison Square Garden, a distance of 85 feet, yesterday afternoon, with probably fatal results. Donaldson traveled for some years with Barnum & Bailey, and has been

the star attraction at the sportsmen's show, now running in the Garden. He has been making two dives daily. The tank is less than eight feet deep, and on two or three former occasions Don-aldson did not have the success expected and came out of the water with hemor rhages from the nose and ears. Harry Cornish has charge of the water sports, and it was he who gave Don-

aldson the signal to dive. Three thoushud persons were present and saw the famous diver lean from the platform, plunge. He shot straight downward, but it was plain before he had got half the distance that he had lost control of his body. He struck the water head first, and failed to come up. Small circles of blood came bubbling up from the bottom, and Harry Reeder, the amateur champion swimmer and an attache of the Garden, plunged into the water. The man dived several times, and finally Reeder brought Donaldson to the surface. He was apparently dead, with blood flowing from his mouth, nostrils and ears, and from wounds on the head.

Donaldson was carried to one of the dressing rooms and attended by several physicians. He was then removed to the New York hospital. He has a fractured skull, with compression of the brain, and the left side of his face is crushed in. The surgeons at the hospital say that his death is only a question of hours. Donaldson was 45 years of age. Just before making this dive he said he intended to challenge Kearney T, Speedy, the champion high diver of the world.

Riotons Negro Soldiers. Chattanooga, Tenn., March S.—The Eighth United States immunes (colored), commanded by Colonel Huggins, were nustered out of the service yesterday. About 50 of the discharged men, many of whom were under the influence of liquor, went home by the Nashville, Chattanooga and St. Louis road, and as they were leaving the yards in the city a number of the men began to discharge revolvers in the air and into sheds and vacant houses. One soldier fired at W. W. Harkins, car inspector of the Nashville road, the bullet striking him in the right leg and inflicting a painful wound. A general fusiliade followed.
Andrew Ledford, a countryman, who
was standing near the track, was shot
in the face and seriously wounded. An effort will be made to secure the arrest of the riotous soldiers.

The Forty-second Ballot. Harrisburg, March 8 .- The ballot for United States senator yesterday resulted in no election. Ex-Senator Quay gained two votes, however, by the abfour members without a pair. The ballot was devoid of interest, except the vote of Senator Brown, of Westmoreland, for "the candidate who has never been defeated nor has never surrendered Matthew Stanley Quay." Mr. Hargrave of Westmoreland, voted for "an un-dicted candidate, Colonel George F. Huff."
