**THE COUNTY SEAT.**

Proceedings at the Criminal Court and  
Other Items of News.

Pottsville, March 10.—Criminal Court kept  
grinding away, and most litigants get  
through sooner or later. But this is  
their own fault, for the law says they  
must appear. Judge Deibel and Judge  
Lyons of Juniata county, to help out  
today. He sent word yesterday that he  
will not be here owing to a cold.

Attorney Houghland, who represents  
Michael Herock, charged with the killing of  
Michael Nicholas at West Bear Ridge, today  
wants the case continued to the May term of  
court, and it is probable John F. Whalen,  
attorney for the prosecution, will agree with  
him.

The Grand Jury found true bills in the following  
cases: William Pritchard, Peter  
Bucklowicz, George Baylis, Harvey, entering  
with intent to kill, receiving stolen  
goods, Moses Frenziusky, prosecutor, Peter  
Bucklowicz, George Baylis, burglary, entering  
in the night with intent to commit a  
felony, Moses Frenziusky, prosecutor.

T. J. Davis, of Turkey Run, was tried yesterday  
on a charge of assault and battery,  
made by his wife. The defendant succeeded  
in making a pretty good case in his own be-  
half and he was acquitted, the case being put  
on the county. Before disposing of the case,  
however, the court administered a lecture to  
the defendant on domestic felicity.

John Gengle, John Gengel and Frank  
Johanna were tried on a charge of assault  
and battery to kill upon a Syrian peddler  
named Adym, of Hazleton. The affair took  
place at Trenton, Gengle and Gengel were  
acquitted. Johanna received a sentence of  
\$5 fine, costs, and six months imprisonment.

The situation in which Samuel Root, of  
Schuylkill Haven, is the plaintiff, and the  
Mill Creek Co. are the defendants, in a suit  
for damages, has been postponed to Friday  
morning.

True bills were found by the grand jury  
against the School Board of New Castle  
township, charging them with mismanagement  
in office. The men under indictment are:  
John McDonald, Luke Nolan, James Wilson,  
James Stone, Joseph Cook and James Com-  
ford, comprising one Board, and Patrick P.  
Moran, James Comford, Patrick O'Donnell,  
Joseph Cook, Luke Nolan and John McDonald,  
the other. They will be called for trial  
next week. Captain Daniel Christian is the  
prosecutor.

Geo. Glanzer, assault and battery, oath of  
Geo. Canner, bill ignored, prosecutor for  
costs.  
John Farfit, larceny as bailee, oath of  
Miriam Hering, plead guilty; \$5 fine, costs  
and 90 days.

Elwood Baumer, pointing a gun, oath of  
Charles P. Gable; not guilty, each pay half  
the costs.  
Thos. H. Dee, of West Mahanoy township,  
who has had one or two at Court nearly  
every term for the many years, will be obliged  
to pay the costs in the cases he brought  
against some parties in Lost Creek on the  
charge of stealing coal. The grand jury  
ignored the bills. Captives were taken for  
Dee's appearance in Court to receive sentence,  
but so far the officers have not produced him.
