PHILIPPINOS ROUTED.

General Wheaton Defeated 3,000 With Slight American Loss.

Manila, March 15.—General Wheaton's forces continue to keep the insurgents on the run, and this afternoon the American commander attacked and defeated 3,000 Filipinos at Pasig. It was a brilliant charge, and the natives were unable to stand the onslaught.

It is believed several hundred Filipinos were killed and captured, and many more wounded. The American loss is slight.

Unfounded Report.

The report that William Derr, former Post Director, who recently left town and went to Philadelphia, died at the latter place, is without foundation in fact. The report greatly worried his wife and family and other relatives here. The circumstances leading to the report are not interesting, as they show how hasty conclusions result in such rumors. A resident of Wm. Penn riding up Main street in an electric car noticed a man standing in a door next to Charles Derr's barber shop and upon arrival home said "Derr the barber at Shenandoah is dead." People who knew Charles Derr were alive and well concluded that the deceased must have been William Derr. The latter, by the way, is enjoying good health and doing well in his new location.

CASES AT THE COURT.

Several Cases on the Criminal Calendar Disposed of To-day.

THE HACKETT JURY DISAGREES!

William Sadosky and Joseph Anderson Got Four Months For Assault and Larceny. William Pritchard, Charged With Burglary, Receives a Like Sentence.

Pottsville, March 15.—Controller Muldoon and the County Commissioners have not yet agreed upon the question of whose duty it is to first sign warrants upon the treasury for supplies, services, etc. The Commissioners say the Controller should first sign, and the latter contends they should endorse the warrants and that he should countersign them if he finds them correct.

J. Harry Filbert, Esq., mercantile appraiser, expects to finish his work in six weeks from date.

The jury in the case of William Hackett, charged with turning a switch at Mahanoy City with intent to wreck a passenger train, was unable to reach a verdict. It was expected that a sealed verdict would be rendered yesterday morning, but when court convened the jury sent in word that it was impossible to reach an agreement. They were allowed to remain in session until 3:30 o'clock when they were called into court and discharged. Foreman Bowen reported that the jury then stood practically the same as on the first ballot and did not feel equal to agreeing. The Judge stated that however much he should like to see them agree to save the interested parties from the expense of another and tedious trial, he did not feel warranted in directing them any instructions that might cause them to reach a conclusion in violation of their own.

Joseph W. Geary Sr., left for Cumberland, Md., to reside. He is a well known civil engineer, and father of the former county surveyor.

Marriage licenses were granted to Curtis Weary and Kate Wolfgang, of Pottsville; O. M. Herb, of Sacramento, and Hannah E. Shade, of Fear-Not.

Henry Wagner, a Pinegrove township farmer, was acquitted of the charge of removing a land-mark, on oath of Johnathan Atwood, of Sacramento, who was sworn in as the prosecutor, but was required to pay half the costs, the prosecutor to pay the other half. W. F. Shepherd was attorney for the prosecutor and R. H. Koch for the defendant.

A case attracting much attention was that brought by Wm. J. Lambert against John H. Hess whom he charged with larceny as well as with the removal of a land-mark. The case was tried at Pottsville on Tuesday, March 14, and the jury returned a verdict of guilty of assault and battery. The charge of larceny was not pressed by the prosecution. They were sentenced each to pay \$25 costs and serve four months in the county jail.

W. W. Carpenter, a colored man, was tried before Judge Marr this afternoon on a statutory charge, on oath of Miss Bankus. He was found guilty, but has not been sentenced.

William Pritchard pleaded guilty to burglary and larceny, on oath of Moses Freshinsky, and sentenced to pay costs, \$10 fine and serve four months.

John Donovan, charged with burglary, caused much amusement by conducting his own case and addressing the jury in a long speech, in which he paid his respects to the prosecutor, Mr. White, and Deputy District Attorney McGeehin, who conducted the prosecution. The case is in the hands of the jury.

Explosion of Gas. George Drabufski, a resident of East Coal street, had his hands, face and neck burned by an explosion of gas in the West Shenandoah colliery this morning. Drabufski says that when he entered his breast to start work his lamp ignited the gas. Dr. Stein dressed the burns and the man went to the miners' hospital.

Property Sold. Justice Shoemaker has purchased for H. W. Titman the North Main street dwellings owned by Amanda Womer. The consideration was \$5,200.

MINE ACCIDENTS.

Injuries Sustained by Workers in Neighboring Collieries.

Henry Mial, miner at the Tunnel Ridge colliery, had his right hand injured by a blow from a hammer.

James O'Brien, miner at Elmwood colliery, had his right eye injured by a piece of steel flying from a pick.

Stephen Clavin, miner at North Mahanoy colliery, had the thumb of his right hand mashed by a fall of top coal. Amputation will be necessary.

Joseph Prince, miner at Buck Mountain colliery, had the top of his right foot injured by a fall of top coal.

Stephen Harper had the little finger of his left hand squeezed between timber and a car in the Mahanoy City colliery.

Deaths and Funerals. Crawford T. Glover, a well known resident of town, died at his home on Strawberry alley last night, aged 82 years. He has been suffering for almost two years, and the cause of death is given as complication of diseases. He leaves a wife and three children. The funeral will take place Friday afternoon at 2 o'clock, interment in Odd Fellows' cemetery.

The remains of William Dech will be interred in the Odd Fellows' cemetery tomorrow afternoon, services in the Trinity Reformed church at 2 o'clock.

The funeral of Mrs. Horace Foelt took place at Tamaqua this afternoon. Anthony Dence, one of Ashland's old and highly respected German citizens, died at the home of his son, John X. Dence, yesterday morning. He was stricken with paralysis on Sunday night, and never rallied from the shock. The funeral will take place tomorrow morning.

Mrs. M. J. wife of William J. Sweeney, died on Saturday in Philadelphia after a long and painful illness due to dropsy and cancer of the stomach. She was 50 years old, and resided at Meuch Chunk, where she married her husband, who with four children survives.

Mr. Sweeney left a few months ago for Battle City, Mont., and was not at home when his wife died. The family resided here at one time, the husband being proprietor of the Watson House.

William Garis, engineer of the Tamaqua passenger train for many years, died at his home in Palo Alto after a short illness. He leaves a widow and several children. Thomas Garis, of Port Carbon, is a brother. Funeral Friday afternoon, interment at Port Carbon.

Accused to Face Investigators. Harrisburg, March 15.—The McCarell bill committee investigating committee will meet this evening in the house chamber. Among the witnesses to be called are Michael I. Costello, ex-Senator Coyle, ex-Representative Moyle, Representatives Spatz, Hersh and S. S. Smith and Editors Littell and O'Toole, of the Scranton Scramantian.

Pennsylvania Populists' Convention. Erie, Pa., March 15.—By order of T. P. Ryder, chairman of the state committee, the state convention of the People's party of Pennsylvania will be held in Philadelphia on Wednesday, May 31, 1899, to nominate candidates for state treasurer, justice of the supreme court and judge of the superior court.

A Judgeship for Weiss. Harrisburg, March 15.—The governor yesterday sent to the senate the nomination of John H. Weiss, of Harrisburg, as judge of the common pleas court of Dauphin county, vice John B. McPherson, resigned. The nomination was confirmed.

Mercantile Appraiser Filbert. Mercantile Appraiser J. H. Filbert is busily at work making his assessment. He commenced work March 21 and has already completed his labors in Ashland, Gordon, Butler, Girardville and Girard. He will finish Mahanoy City and Shenandoah this week. Mr. Filbert is doing his work in a systematic, painstaking manner, and expects that the work will consume about two months of his time. After he has completed the appraisal he will sit at the court house to hear appeals. The report must be published the first week in May.

WHEATON'S VICTORIES.

Our Philippines Forces Keep the Rebels on the Run.

ENEMY SET FIRE TO PASIG.

Met a Heavy Force of Rebels Between Pateros and Taguig.

THE WORK OF SCOTT'S BATTERY.

Shelling the Woods and Towns in the Onward March of Our Troops—The Oregon Volunteers Taking an Active Part in the Fighting—The Gunboats Actively Aiding the Troops in Suppressing the Rebel Fire—The Filipinos Shipped Guns in Coffins For Alleged Funeral Services in Church.

Manila, March 15.—Yesterday morning, hearing the insurgents' bugles sounding, Scott's battery dropped three shrapnel shells into the woods on the left of the Pasig church. No reply was made, and at 7:45 o'clock the Twenty-second regular infantry advanced until they encountered a number of volleys. This fire was returned with interest.

The line then wheeled towards Pateros in the following order: The Oregon volunteers, the Twentieth regulars, the Washington volunteers, a cavalry detachment, the Twenty-second regulars and reserve artillery.

The troops followed the roads, while the gunboats Ceste and Laguna de Bay assisted in suppressing the fire on the left bank.

General Wheaton's column advanced beyond Pasig to the shore of Laguna de Bay, sweeping everything before them. The enemy made a running fight and suffered severe loss.

The rebels' avenue of communication north and south is now closed, the American cordon stretching over a mile from the river to the lake.

In the afternoon Wheaton's column encountered the enemy in such force between Pateros and Taguig as
