## PEACE PROCLAMATION

Will Be Issued to Filipinos by President Schurman.

## AGINALDO'S SAVAGE METHODS.

He Orders the Summary Execution of One of His Generals Who Urges a Cessation of Hostilities and Praises Death Sentence on Twelve Others.

Manila, March 21.—The United States Philippines commission has held its first meeting and decided to issue a proclamation to the inhabitants of the islands. President Schurman will prepare it. The document will explain the spirit in which the United States intends to fulfill the trust imposed and will call upon the people of the islands to lay down their arms and co-operate in the interest of good government.

It is reported on a hitherto reliable authority that Aguinaldo is taking extreme measures to suppress signs calculated to cause a cessation of hostilities. Twelve adherents of the plan of independence, residents of Manila, have been condemned to death because they were advising surrender, and all loyal Filipinos have been called upon to perform the national service of dispatching them.

On Friday last General Lagarda visited Malolos for the purpose of advising Aguinaldo to quit. He argued with this insurgent leader and attempted to convince him of the folly of his persistence in the face of overwhelming odds. Aguinaldo was furious at the advice and ordered General Lagarda to be executed immediately. The unfortunate general was promptly decapitated.

Among the incidents of Sunday's fighting was the coolness exhibited by a company of the Washington volunteers, who crossed the river in a native canoe under a heavy fire—15 being taken across on each trip of the small boat—to attack the enemy's trenches.

**Philippine Commission Organized.**  
Washington, March 21.—A dispatch was received at the state department yesterday from Chairman Schurman, of the Philippine commission, announcing a meeting of that body at Manila yesterday. The meeting was a preliminary one for the purpose of organization. Mr. McArthur, who was connected with the United States legation at Madrid during General Woodford's incumbency of that office, is to be the secretary of the commission.

**Hesitate to Interfere With Otis.**  
Washington, March 21.—The question of permitting the Spanish government to negotiate with Aguinaldo for the release of the Spanish prisoners held by him is still under consideration. The president himself will be the person to decide whether or not this shall be done, the authorities hesitating to interfere in any way with the working out of General Otis' plans, and he has forbidden the ransom.

**German Raising Horse Flesh.**  
Washington, March 21.—The restrictions upon the importation of meat into Germany have operated unfortunately at Strassburg, according to United States Consul Baehr, at Kiel. The home supply of meat has been curtailed by the prevalence of diseases, and prices are high, beef costing from 14 to 35 cents per pound. Poultry and game are so expensive that only the wealthy can afford them, and many families are using horse flesh, the prices of which ranges from 6 to 8 cents per pound.

## NEW JERSEY LEGISLATURE

Rushing Through Bills to Reach Adjournment This Week

Trouton, March 21.—Both branches of the legislature held long sessions last night, and looking to final adjournment on Friday matters were rushed through with little debate. The senate refused to concur in the house amendment to Senator Ketchum's soldier pay bill. The house amendment allowed an additional \$40 each for clothing. Governor Voorhes sent to the senate these names for fish and game commissioners: Howard P. Frothingham, Benjamin P. Morris, William A. Halsey and J. Frank Bick. The senate passed the following bills: Providing for a Russian and Hungarian interpreter in first class cities; authorizing an assessment of one-quarter of 1 per cent on the salaries of police officers to establish a pension fund. The house, by a vote of 32 to 23, passed senate bill 21, known as the Washington Park license bill. This bill was introduced in the interest of William J. Thompson, of Gloucester. It provides a separate license fee for each bar.

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## RESISTING HEALTH OFFICERS.

Three Killed at Laredo, Tex., Before Order Was Restored.

Laredo, Tex., March 21.—The crisis in the disturbance here over the carrying out of the state health officers' regulations in suppressing the smallpox epidemic seems to be passed. When the work of removing the patients was resumed yesterday in the afternoon, dozens of people report seeing wounded men, but how many saw the same ones is not known. The shooting was followed by a number of scattered shots.

At 11:45 a. m. a detachment of the Tenth (colored) cavalry, U. S. A., mounted and fully armed with 100 rounds of ammunition each, arrived at the market place. City Marshal Joseph Bartholome was sworn in as an officer, and under his direction the crowds were quickly dispersed. The leader of the first crowd encountered by the military undertook to talk instead of obeying orders, and was promptly knocked down with the butt of a carbine and so badly hurt that he died within a short time after being carried away. His followers took the hint and rapidly fled.

**General Young Rebuks His Officers.**  
Augusta, Ga., March 21.—General Young has issued an order severely criticizing the commissioned officers and the finding of the court martial in the trial of the rioters of the Fifteenth Minnesota regiment which occurred March 4 and 5, when one of their number was killed by a constable. He says in part: "The deplorable inefficiency, incapacity, weakness and timidity exhibited by nearly all of those commissioned officers present at the disgraceful and violent outbreak in the camp is incredible except on the abundant sworn testimony of said officers themselves. It is with profound regret that the corps commander finds himself constrained to punish enlisted men while, through circumstances beyond his control, certain officers unworthy of the commissions they hold are permitted to go home with clean records."

**REED INTERVIEWS M'KINLEY.**  
They Say to Each Other "How Do You Do?"  
Brunswick, Ga., March 21.—President McKinley is today on Jekyll Island, the club home of a number of eastern millionaires on St. Simon's sound, ten miles up the coast from Brunswick. With him are Mrs. McKinley, Vice President and Mrs. Hobart and Senator Hanna. They are guests of ex-Secretary of the Interior Cornelius N. Bliss. In another cottage on the island is Speaker Thomas B. Reed. All persons in any way concerned in their presence at Jekyll assert positively and unwaveringly that the visit of the two political leaders at the same time is a mere coincidence. The speaker will probably leave Jekyll this afternoon or tomorrow and the president tomorrow forenoon.

A census of Brunswick's 12,000 inhabitants could have been taken about the time the railroad track when the presidential train reached here. A committee from the Jekyll Island club welcomed the president, and assisted by Mayor Atkinson and former Mayor Crovatt, escorted him to the island.

The president was greeted with a few cheers, which he acknowledged by lifting his hat, when he emerged from the train and assisted Mrs. McKinley to the carriage which took them to where the revenue cutter Colfax lay in waiting. Another smaller volley of cheers broke forth as the boat cast off and started on the trip to Jekyll.

When the president walked ashore on the island Mr. Reed smilingly raised his hat and said: "How do you do, Mr. President?"

Mr. McKinley acknowledged the greeting with a low bow, and said: "How do you do, Mr. Speaker?"

The president and Mrs. McKinley entered a carriage and moved away and the speaker stroled off. Late in the afternoon the president and the vice president went out driving.

**ANOTHER KANSAS HORROR.**  
Father Charged With the Murder of His Five Children.  
Hutchinson, Kan., March 21.—An atrocious crime was revealed here yesterday when the coroner and his assistants removed the dead bodies of five children from the house occupied by John Moore, which burned at an early hour. A coroner's jury investigated the case, and in accordance with the jury's return, the father of the dead children, was arrested on a charge of murder.

When the firemen and neighbors reached the burning house the father was the only member of the family of seven found outside. His actions were queer and he would not talk. While the building was still burning, and his children were being taken to the hospital, he took a horse from his stable and rode away. When the firemen entered the house after having partly quenched the flames, they found the five children lying side by side in a bed on the floor, all dead, but not badly burned. The skull of each child was deeply indented and from the dent long fractures extended. All but one of the children had been stabbed in the neck. The throat of the 3-year-old boy had been slashed so deep that the spinal column had been severed.

Before the coroner's jury Moore pretended to believe that an exploding lamp had caused the fire. He said he was awakened by the smoke and he found the house afire all over. He did not try to save his children, because he knew they must be dead, as the fire started in their room. His riding away from the fire he explained by stating that his wife was away from home attending a sick friend, and that he went to tell her of their loss.
