OMAHA'S FATAL FIRE.

Women Suddenly Hemmed in by Fearful Flames.

TWO DEAD AND FOUR MAY DIE.

The Fire Originated From a Gasoline Stove Explosion, and Spread So Rapidly That Seven Women Were Forced to Jump Down Forty Feet.

Omaha, March 22.—Comparatively insignificant in material destruction, but appalling in the harvest of death and suffering, was a fire that partially destroyed the Patterson block, at Seventh and Douglas streets, yesterday afternoon. Two of its victims have already passed away, four more are not expected to live, and about 25 others are suffering from broken limbs and burned heads and faces.

The fire started shortly after 3 o'clock. A group of women, busy with the affairs of the secret orders with which they were affiliated, were in a moment brought face to face with death. Sixty seconds later seven of them lay huddled and bleeding on the pavement, to which they had jumped 40 feet before, and the others were rescued after they had been more or less severely injured in their desperate dash down the single flight of stairs that led to safety.

The fire originated from a gasoline stove explosion in the rear of the third floor of the building and next to the elevator shaft. It was not discovered until it had spread to the adjoining apartments and the entire floor was filled with smoke and flame.

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THREE MORE BODIES Recovered From the Ruins of the Windsor Hotel. FORTY-EIGHT ARE STILL MISSING. The Bodies Recovered Are Terribly Charred, Dismembered and Unrecognizable. Though Two Hotel Servants Claim to Identify One by the Dress.

New York, March 22.—Three bodies were recovered from the ruins of the Windsor hotel yesterday. They are badly charred, and great difficulty is being experienced in the identification. The bodies recovered yesterday were that of a female of small stature. The arms and legs were missing. It was first thought it was the body of Miss Doris Hoffman, of Baltimore, a woman 60 years of age, who is among the missing.

Warren F. Leland. daughter lost their lives, is still confined by illness, but will recover. The recognition of Mrs. Margaret Auzo made by the two employees of the hotel seemed to be very positive. Both recognized the beaded dress, part of which remained. Mrs. Auzo had been a guest of the hotel for 15 years, and trainer and head waitress on the floor in the dining room. He identified her by the prominent jawbones and by the teeth. Curran also recognized these features. Mrs. Auzo and Miss Doris Hoffman, of Baltimore, were seen, it is said, to go to their rooms on the fifth floor shortly before the fire broke out.

The workmen have succeeded in clearing away considerable of the debris for a distance of about 20 feet toward the interior of the mass and to a distance downward over this territory to the ceiling of the cellar. They had struck at intervals what appeared to be party walls, and were digging around them toward the spot where the fire broke out. The servants of the hotel were for the most part on the top floor of the Forty-seventh street side, and the workmen have unearthed many charred articles of cheap clothing in this vicinity, and cheap jewelry as well, which evidently belonged to the domestics. It was estimated that with the speed with which the work is progressing at present it will be at least a week before the pile will have been gone over, and it may be longer. All during the night articles of more or less value were brought to the surface by the workmen's shovels and turned over to the policeman, who were stationed about to receive, number them and take them to the station house to await some one to come and identify them. All of the most valuable of the articles are turned over to the coroner's office. Many of the things found are of no value to anybody, but are taken just as much care of by the police as if they were worth their weight in gold.

SAWMILL BOILER EXPLODES. Three Men Instantly Killed and Three Others Seriously Injured. Cumberland, Md., March 22.—Word was received here yesterday of the explosion of the sawmill boiler at the plant of Hudson Shuss, near Mattie, 15 miles north of Cumberland, Milling Planters Wm. Daniel Snyder, Dr. W. H. W. Snyder, and a man named Shuss, who was sawyer, and wounded John Snyder, Harry Siegle and Anthony Whitfield. The boiler had been used for many years. The fly-wheel, weighing about a ton, was thrown a great distance. The big steel saw broke into shrapnel. Snyder was hurled through the air and about 100 feet, and Whit's head was blown off. When found his feet were entangled in the carriage, with his shoulders hanging down in the creek. A pin was driven clear through Whitfield's neck from the back. John Snyder's condition is serious. The mill was almost entirely obliterated. Shuss, who was within 60 feet of the boiler, escaped with a broken leg.

An Exaggerated Report. Kingston, Jan., March 22.—Latest advices from a correspondent of French Guiana, indicate that the previous intelligence about a collision between the French and Brazilian delimitation commissioners was exaggerated. The truth seems to be that a dispute arose between the Brazilian and French commissioners, which was therefore decided to suspend the delimitation proceedings until the respective governments could be communicated with. Meanwhile some quite personal unpleasantness arose between the French Senegalese troops and the Brazilians, which eventually led to an encounter, in which a few on each side were hurt.

Paris, March 22.—The series of explosions in government ammunition depots, which commenced with the terrible disaster at La Goubran, near Toulon, on Saturday week, is continuing at Bonrepos and Marvilles, was continued last evening, when an alarming explosion occurred in a laboratory of explosives attached to the war department, where experiments were being made with a new kind of gunpowder. Three officials were injured. All the windows in the neighborhood were smashed and considerable other damage was done. Although it is not believed that the explosion was the result of foul play, great excitement followed.
