The Fusion Board met in Mahanoy City this morning.

Senator S. A. Loech is critically ill at his home in Schuylkill Haven, and no one is allowed to see him.

Prof. Miller, of Frackville, is making an active canvass to succeed Supt. Weiss.

The mine breach on the main street of Mahanoy Plane, which was recently filled up again, settled to the depth of four feet on Monday afternoon.

In a fight at a cake walk at Marietta, Peter Smith was badly clubbed, and his injuries may prove fatal.

The big double beating engine at North Ashland colliery is being removed to Locust Gap colliery at the big shaft.

The Chief Burgess of Centra enforced his orders on Sunday against keeping saloons open, and the town was "dry."

Bears have been stealing pigs and lambs near Arundelville, Adams county, and the farmers are trying to limit the damage.

The Elks Minstrels of Ashland will give a performance the latter part of next month.

The P. & R. railroad employes at Mahanoy Plane were paid to-day by Paymaster Guy.

The Tanaga Recorder appeared in enlarged form yesterday, and was well filled with display material for the week.

Rev. Joseph Hunter, pastor of the Tanaga Presbyterian church, has accepted a call from Berwick, with increased salary.

An amateur specialty company has been organized by frequenters of Galvin's pool room in Mahanoy City.

Among the bills passed on second reading in the Legislature is one making five per cent. the legal rate of interest for the loan or use of money. The rate now is six per cent.

A pension of \$8 per month has been granted to James D. Yost, of Locust Dale.

According to a decision by Judge Peck, of Bradford Co., constables are entitled to the new fees, provided by the act of the Legislature, passed at the present session, upon their qualifying at the first return day.

Miss Fanny Morgan, a lady evangelist from Reading, is conducting revival services in the English Baptist church of St. Clair.

On railroad tracks near Shamokin a train killed Charles Dewell.

The sale of the personal effects of the late William Dorbach, at Mahanoy Plane, will take place on Saturday.

Bradford county Republicans will hold their primaries on April 29, and convention on May 4.

The Bethlehem Iron Company yesterday shipped a 18-inch breech-loading mortar to Sandy Hook.

Wash Orme, of St. Clair, who is at the Miners' hospital being treated for injuries received at Chamberlain colliery, is improving slowly.

Bethlehem will have some of its streets macadamized this year with trap rock, at an expense of \$50,000.

Frank Carter, land agent of the C. & I. Co., was reported critically ill at his residence in Pottsville.

Lawyer Taylor, of Bethlehem, has purchased for a mining syndicate the Geisinger farm, of 400 acres, just outside of that town.

Governor Stone and staff will go to Scranton on Thursday to participate in the public welcome to the Thirtieth Volunteer Regiment.

The Atlantic Cement Company, composed principally of New Yorkers, will establish a cement plant near Egypt, Lehigh county, with a capital stock of \$300,000.

Eighty-year-old Jacob C. Mohler, a prominent farmer of Mill Creek township, Lebanon county, yesterday took out a license to wed Miss Maria Beber, aged 56 years, of Hoagsville, Cumberland county.

Danish Method of Curing Cheese.

Denmark and Holland are the largest exporters of dairy products in Europe. In both of these countries the most intelligent thought is given to the perfecting of all processes in that branch of agriculture. A Danish method to prevent the generation of mites in cheese is said to be entirely effective. The process consists in continually whitewashing the rooms in which the cheeses are cured until the mites are destroyed, the cheeses before being placed in these apartments being steeped in brine for a whole day. During their stay of a fortnight in the curing rooms they are carefully scraped and wiped daily.

Finally they are washed in lime-water and are then stored on thoroughly clean shelves. Unfortunately for a thorough test of this process Danish cheeses are not so subject to the generation of mites as are French and Italian sorts. If these could be freed from the attack of mites through the use of the Danish process, its value would be incalculable.—New York Sun.

SHERMAN STILL ALIVE.

Unfounded Reports of the Death of the Ex-Premier.

Santiago de Cuba, March 22.—There is no truth in the statements published in the United States, and called back here, representing that John Sherman is dead. It is incomprehensible how these reports originated. The American line steamer Paris, Captain Frederick Watkins, arrived here last evening before dark, and it was immediately reported that Mr. Sherman was not only alive, but better, resting easy, and expected to recover. He will be transferred, if all goes favorably, to the United States cruiser Chicago on Friday. The cruiser is now coaling at Kingston, Jamaica.

The Chicago was dispatched by the navy department to Kingston to bring Mr. Sherman to the United States immediately, as the Paris was not expected to return with her excursionists for some time. The Chicago, however, did not reach Kingston in time, but upon meeting the Paris off Kingston made arrangements to take Mr. Sherman off the latter vessel on Friday, the change to be made at Caimanera, a few miles east of Santiago.

Charged With Embezzlement.

Harrisburg, March 22.—Ex-Sheriff William Sheedy yesterday caused the arrest of Isaac W. Guiles, delinquent city tax collector from 1885 to 1893, inclusive, on a charge of embezzlement of city taxes of 1893. He was taken before Alderman Nicholas, who held him in \$1,000 bail for a hearing next Tuesday. Mr. Sheedy was one of the defendant's bondsmen in 1891. The court some time ago found that the bondsmen were liable for the amount of Guiles' shortage. Guiles took an appeal to the supreme court, but as yet there has been no decision.

Command of New Foundland Squadron

St. John's, N. F., March 22.—Special significance attaches to the appointment of Commodore Gifford to command the British squadron in New Foundland waters during the coming fishing season. No officer so far advanced in the British navy list was ever appointed before to this command, he being the senior of every officer in the British North American fleet except Admiral Fisher. His selection is regarded as indicating a determination on the part of Great Britain to enforce a settlement of disputed questions in this quarter by strengthening the squadron.
