DEATHS AND FUNERALS.

Neurology Reports of This and Other Towns of the County.
Frank Carter, one of Pottsville's most prominent citizens, died yesterday at his home of general debility. He has been a invalid for the past four years. Mr. Carter was born in December 1834 and was therefore 65 years of age. He was a native of Pottsville and was reared at that place. He was land agent for the P. & R. C. & I. Co., and held that position up to the time of his death. He was identified with the publication of the *Mining Journal* from the time of the death of Colonel Ramsey to within a few years ago. He was twice married, his second wife, who survives, being a daughter of Judge C. L. Pershing. The funeral will be held Saturday afternoon at 2 o'clock, interment in a Pottsville cemetery.
George W. Christian, son of Jacob Christian, of Pottsville, died in Philadelphia, from typhoid fever. He was 34 years old and leaves a widow and two children.
Samuel Spotts, aged 42 years, died suddenly on Tuesday evening at his home in Stuartville, a suburb of Mt. Carmel. A wife and six children survive him.
The funeral of Frank Myers, the Mahanoy City druggist, took place this morning, at seven o'clock, and was attended by members of the P. & A. M. and I. O. O. F. The remains were taken to Myerstown, Berks county, for interment. Services were conducted at the family residence by Rev. G. M. Beck, pastor of the German Lutheran church, and Rev. Otto Brandt, pastor of the Episcopal church. At Myerstown the services were held in the United Brethren church. The pall bearers were Messrs. G. E. Blaw, George W. Dunlap, I. Y. Sollenberger, T. L. Hess, L. V. Bunch, George Tillgore, John Holland, Dr. G. F. Brundage.

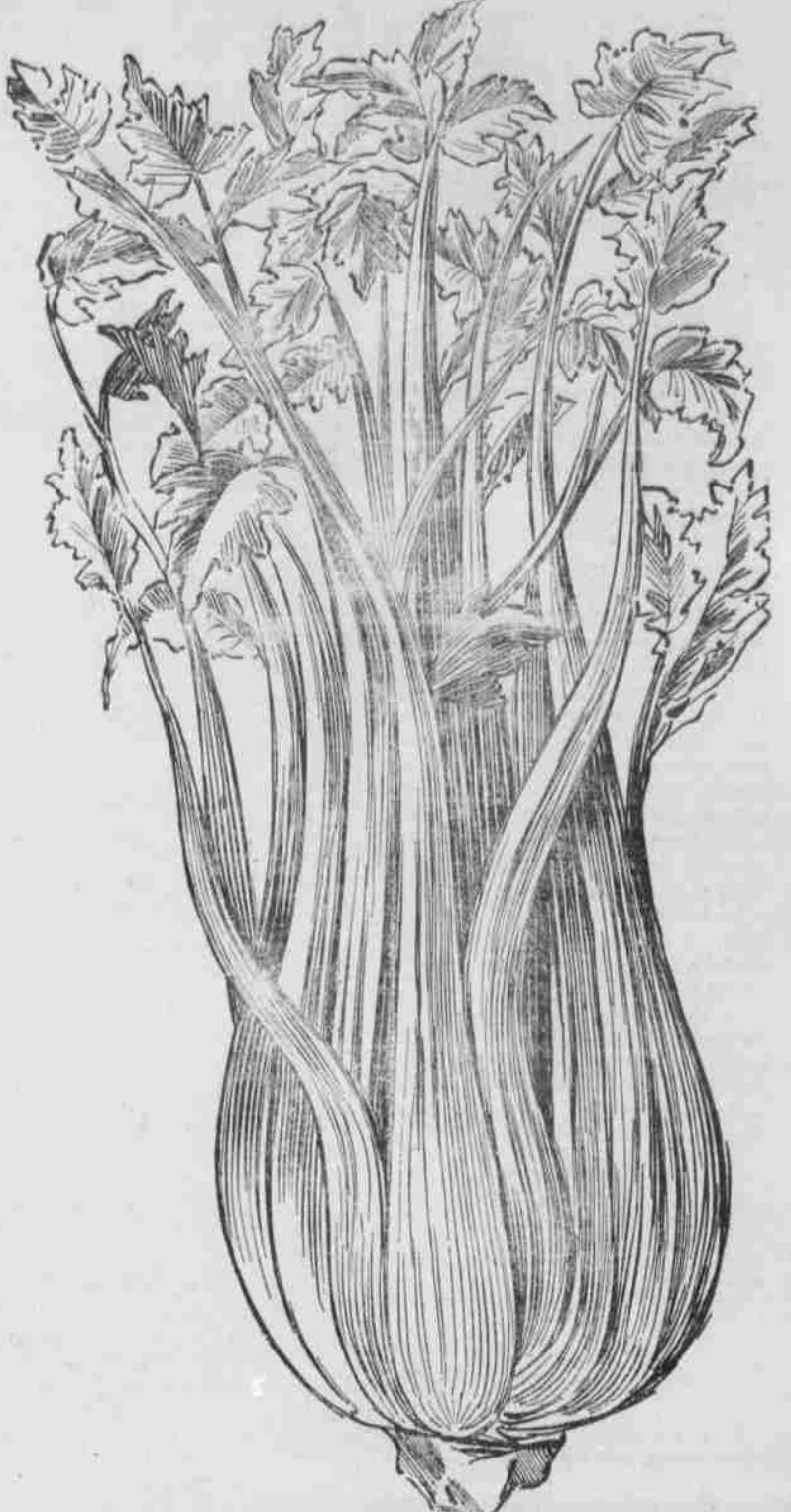
