They Held a Military Company at Bay All Night.

THE MURDERING PREMEDITATED

Their First Victim Had Sued Them For Legal Services, and They Shot Him Down in Court-Another Vietim Shot From Their Barricaded Home. Bowling Green, O. March 27,-John

and Paul Zeliner, who on Saturday murdered Attorney Westenhaver, at Hoytaville, and after entrenching themselves in their house, near that place, defied arrest, were finally taken yester day morning, and are now in jail at Bowling Green. Peaceable methods finally prevailed

in the capture, although it is doubtful if the capture would have been effected except for the fact that the Zeliners were nearly out of automation, and they knew surrender was the only method of saving themselves from an infuriated The militia had planned to make a stand about daylight and strict picket duty was maintained by the Bioomahle Rifles all night, the men being stationed around the house at short intervals and at sufficient distance from the house to prevent the Zelfmers from picking the nen off. Several narrow escapes from offlets happened during the evening, for

the Zeitners, being sharpshooters, were picking out and shooting at everyone venturing within 500 yards.

Ex-Sheriff Itiggs, of Bowling Breen, went to Heytsville during the night to see Attorney Hood, whom the Zeitners withday to see a likely provided to wished to consult. Hood promised to go to the house at daylight, but when the time came he refused to go, evidently fearing the Zeltners would shoot

any one approaching the piace.
At 5:80 yesterday morning ex-Sheriff Riggs, accompanied by a neighbor named Brown, started toward the house. They walked the distance alone. The Zelt ners offered no fesistance to their approach, and they were admitted to the

The Zeltners seemed not disposed at first to give up, and stated that they feared the mob which remained outside the militis lines. After half an hour's talk they agreed, and Sheriff Kingabury was notified. He at once made arrangements to afford the Zeltners the protection of the militia.

Mrs. John Zeitner, who was in the house with her three children during the trouble, was not molested, and is there

Developments since the arrest of the Zeltners indicate that they not only deliberated over the bloody defiance of law, but also prepared for it, having a large stock of ammunition in their res dence, two miles from Hoyts Corners. E. H. Westenhaver, ex-solicitor of North Baltimore, had been their at torney in numerous cases and sued them for his fees. The jury and witnesses had been sworn before Justice Burgoon, in the township house at Hoyts Corners. in Westenhaver's suit to recover fees when Paul Zeltner demanded some papers of Westenhaver and attempted to take them from his pocket. John Zeltner then joined in demanding the papers and immediately fired the shot that kill-

ed Westenhaver.
As the Zeltners had their horses ready for mounting and escape it is thought that they had arranged to get Westenhaver into a fight for the purpose of "doing him," although they did not give the victim time to make demonstrations towards them. The Zeltners kept up their firing until they mounted their horses and continued as hundreds of citizens pursued them for two miles to their residence. After they reached their house they kept up constant fire the rest of the day and during Saturday night. They had a large stock of unition stored at home

While the feeling is intense around North Baltimore on account of the mur-der of Westenhaver, it is equally intense around Hoyts Corners on account the killing of their neighbor, Claren Weidmeyer, who was with the sheriff's posse Saturday night. When Weldmeyer fell volley after volley was poured into the crowd from the upper story of the Zeltner house, and the Zeltners knew that they were firing on their neighbors as well as on the sheriff and his deputies. Before the arrival of troops during the night a cannon used in shooting oil tanks in case of fire and a quantity of nitro-glycerine had been secured, so that there would have been trouble after sunrise if the troops had

The Zeltner brothers and their famwers no doubt saved by the prompt arrival of troops under the orders of Governor Bushnell. The troops stood between the firing from the house and the enraged crowd, and not only cap-tured the desperadoes, but also protected them from violence all the way from the southern boundary of this county to the jail here, a distance of over 20 miles, with excitement at the highest

pitch all along the route.


