WRECKED PORTLAND LOCATED.

It Is Believed There Are Still Many Bodies in the Wreck. Boston, March 29.-It is believed that the buil of the lost steamer Portland has been located. The crew of the schooner Maud S. on Monday hanled up a quantity of steamer finishings entangled in their fishing trawts. The wreckage consists of two electric light brackets, mattress, some minor cabin furnishings. a beaving line and a garter. The po at which it was brought up was 2214 miles from Boston light, 17 miles south

southeast of Cape Ann and 24 miles from Highland light, and the depth of the water between 50 and 60 fathoms. Only a few weeks ago another fisherman at very nearly the same place-brought up some wash bowl fittings, by these could not be positively identified. The articles just found, when brought ashore, were positively identified by Agent C. F. Williams, of the Portland line, as being a part of the furnishing in one of the steamer's calains, while the finding of the garter leads to the belief that there are bodies in the wreck. Of the 200 human bodies who went down with the steamer in the gale of Nov. 26 and 27 the remains of less than 30 vere recovered along the shore of Cape Cod, over 30 miles away. It is pos sible, therefore, that many bodies ar in the wreck, but grapples will be the sole means of bringing to light any ad-ditional portions of the vessel. The steamboat people will take no action in the matter, leaving further action to the owner of the vessel, John F. Burke, of New York. A number of proposition New York. A number of proposition have already been submitted to Mr. Burke for the raising of the steamer. based on the theory that very little of the vessel was washed away before she sank, and that if found she could be made serviceable again.
