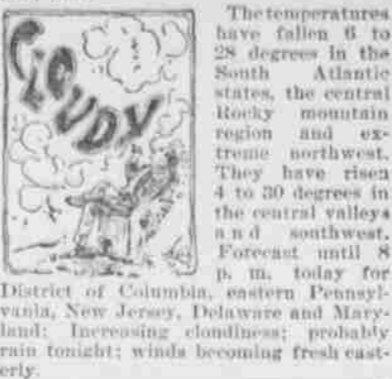
More Amusement. Landlord Jacob Hents has added a new piano to his place of business. It is a fine instrument and will be presented over by a clever manipulator of the keys.

DEATHS AND FUNERALS.

Necrology Reports of This and Other Towns of the County.

The six-days-old twin son of Thomas Davis, of Mahanoy City, died this morning. Tuesday night three of Ashland's prominent residents passed away. Laura, wife of Morris W. Schwalm, of Taylorville, died suddenly at the home of her parents, Mr. and Mrs. John Young, from apoplexy of the lungs, aged 59 years.

Her husband was the Republican candidate for Legislature last fall. Mrs. Fred Schilling, wife of a former Supervisor, aged 42 years, was the second one to pass away, and the third was Peter Leising, an aged and highly respected German citizen, aged 72 years.

Another prominent resident of Pottsville has passed away in the person of Mrs. Imabella Palmer. She died yesterday, after a long illness, aged 77 years. She was a daughter of Jacob Seitzinger, and leaves two children to survive her. Funeral on Saturday at 2 o'clock.

The funeral of Dr. D. W. Hland, who died suddenly at his home in Pottsville on the 28th inst., will take place to-morrow afternoon, from the family residence, at 3 o'clock. The interment will be private.

Haonah Madara, wife of Irish Madara, of Gilberton, died at the Schuylkill Haven hospital this morning. She had been in the hospital of the institution but a short time. The remains will be removed to Gilberton to-morrow.

The funeral of Oscar Leisey, the young brakeman killed on Sunday by the explosion of a loading engine 302 at Mohrsville, took place this afternoon at Pinesboro.

BEFORE THE JUSTICES.

Cross Suit Over An Encounter at the Furnace Colliery.

Hawris Anikawicz was before Justice Shoemaker last night, charged with assault and battery by George Karlitzi. He waived a hearing and entered \$300 bail, upon entering a cross suit for assault and battery and threats to kill, and Karlitzi entered \$300 bail. Anikawicz is employed as watchman at the Furnace colliery. He says that, on last Sunday night, Karlitzi stopped at the colliery while on his way home from this town to Justice Shoemaker last night for throwing filthy water over Mrs. Mary Karper, during a quarrel.

Cash For The Hospital. The appropriation to the State Hospital at Fountain Springs, as recommended by the House committee on appropriations, will be \$83,000, instead of \$83,100, as was reported several days ago. Of this amount \$70,000 will be used for the maintenance of the institution, and \$13,000 will be devoted to the construction of a new ward to be used especially for the treatment of burned patients, for whom there has been no special provision made heretofore.

The remainder will go to the general fund that is devoted to special hospital needs. Friends of the hospital have been Harrisburg this week and are confident the legislators recognize the needs of this institution.

Important to Property Owners. As the moving season is at hand, it will be well for all persons having properties to rent to remember that all leases of property must have United States government revenue stamps attached. Those for one year must have a twenty-five cent stamp, for two or three years, a fifty-cent stamp, and for over three years a stamp costing one dollar.

If no stamp lease is used, then each receipt for rent must bear a stamp.
