

THE HERO OF MALOLOS.

Colonel Funston, of Kansas, Has Had

an Adventurous Carser. Kansas City, Mo., April 1.-Colonel Frederick Funston, of the Twentieth Kansas infautry, who was the first man to enter Malolos yesterday, and whose brilliant record since the Philippine ampaign opened has attracted much attention, is a son of ex-Congressman E. H. Funston, of the Second Kansas dis-trict. He was born in Ohio 33 years ago, and is a graduate of the Kansas State university. In his younger days Funston was a reporter on the Fort Smith Tri-nune. During President Harrison's adbune. ulnistration he was sent to Alaska by the government on a hunt for specimens and had many thrilling experiences. He made a canoe trip alone 900 miles up the Yukon. In the fall of 1894 Funston went to Cuba and enlisted in the Cuban For two years he fought valiant ly for the cause of the insurgents. At one time he was commissioned a colonel and commanded the entire artillery forces of the Cubana under General Garcia. He fired the first dynamite gun used by the Cubans in their war against the Spanish, and was in many severe battles. In one charge he received a bullet just below the heart. He returned to Kausas and had barely re-covered from his wound when Governor Leedy appointed him colonel of the Kansas regiment. Last full Colonel Funston was called to Florida, and gave General Miles many points of value regarding Cuba. Funston's friends have urged him for appointment as brigadier general.




