County Seat. Pottsville, April 12.—Several independent telephone companies are springing up in different parts of the county in opposition to the Bell company, but the future must de-termine their success. Two or three years ago a number of Shenandoah capitalists and one or two other monicd men from different parts of the region secured a charter for an independent company, were granted rights of way through every town and township with the single exception of Potraville, and here they struck a snag. The Bell people apparently controlled our Councilmen at that time-anyhow, they refused to allow an op-position company to compete with the present position company to compete with the present monopoly, notwithstanding rates less than half what is now paid for 'phones was as-sured. Being unable to scure the right of way here the project was dropped at the time, but I am told another effort may be made by the Shenandouh company this summer, the complexion of our Conneil having changed in the meantime and likely to be

more liberal. Since then another company has been chartered in the big town above the moun-tain, known as the Equitable Telephone Company. This has been followed by the application for and granting of a charter to the Anthracite Telephone Company, of Pottsville, capital \$2,000. This is the com-pany recently organized by local capitalists, readed by George J. Wadlinger, Adolph Prince, Joseph Wadlinger and others. It will nnect all the towns in the county and bave ctions with companies in other counties.
