SAMOAN COMMISSION.

The President Instructs Our Representative, Bartlett Tripp.

ANTICIPATES QUICK AGREEMENT

Mr. Tripp Believes That There Will Be No Disposition on the Part of Any of the Three Commissioners to Prolong the Conference.

Washington, April 18.-Ex-Minister Bartlett Tripp, the American member of the Samoan commission, arrived here last evening from his home in Yankton, S. D. He had a conference with the president and Secretary of State Hay today, when his instruc-tions were given him. The entire com-

mission, Baron Sternburg, Mr. Eliot and Mr. Tripp, will be entertained at luncheon by Secretary Hay.

Mr. Tripp said last night that he would leave direct for San Francisco either tonight or tomorrow morning. He had not been acquainted as yet with the plans of the other two commisssioners, and the exact time of his departure had not been fixed. He declined to talk over the Samoan ques-tion and explained that even if ne had any special knowledge of the islands which he was going, the diplomatic nature of his mission precluded his entering into any statement of his views. He said, however, that he apprehended no unnecessary delays in the negotiations, and that he believed an agreement on the questions at issue would be readily reached at an early date. While he had had no communication with the other two commissioners on the subject he was confident there was no disposition on the part of any of the three to make the r tions cover a long period, and he did not believe any obstacles to a speedy adjustment would be interposed. He himself hoped for a speedy and satisfactory agreement between the powers.

While there has been no meeting of the commission, it is understood that Mr. E. V. Morgan, of New York, will be appointed secretary of the commission, so there also has been considerable gossip connecting the name of Dr. Wilhelm Solf with that office.

With Mr. Tripp's arrival here all the members of the commission are now in town. Mr. Elliot, the British commissioner, leaves this evening for the east on a short trip, and will proceed thence to Chicago, where he will join Baron Sternberg, the German commissioner. The latter leaves to-morrow afternoon, and it is quite probable that he and Mr. Tripp may arrange to travel together. This hurried departure will permit the execution of the plans for sailing from San Francisco on the Badger on the date fixed upon, the 25th.

The Elections in Spain. Madrid, April 18.—Judging from the election returns thus far received the government may be expected to get 285 out of 410 seats. Two hundred and forty-three ministerialists have been elected, including 180 Silvelists, 33 Polaviejists and 30 Pidalists. Senor Sagasta has been returned by a small majority for his birthplace, Logrone, after a sharp contest with a Republi-can. For the first time since 1868 Senor Romero y Robledo failed to get a seat. Senor Emilio Castelar, the distinguished Republican statesman, was defeated at Murcia. Only 15 Republicans were elected. At Tortoss southwest of Tarragona, two persons were killed and several injured in elec-

OUR SOLDIERS IN CUBA

Army Reorganization Reduces the Departments to Five. Washington, April 18.—The secretary of war vesterday issued orders for the reorganization of the military departments in Cuba in acrordance with the change in the conditions resulting from the demobilization of the vol-unteer troops on that island. The number of departments is reduced from seven to five, the two eliminated being the department of Pinar del Rio, commanded by Brigadier General Hasbrouck, and the department of Matan-zas, commanded by Brigadier General Bates. The department of Pinar del Rio is consolidated with the department of the province of Havana, and Brigadier General Lee is assigned to the command of the two combined de partments. The department of Matanzas is consolidated with the department of Santa Clara, and Brigadier General Wilson is assigned to the

QUAY'S LEGAL BATTLE.

Expert Goldsmith Puts in Another Day Answering Questions.

THE CASE WILL REACH THE JURY

The Admission of Goldsmith's Evidence Settles That Point-The Ex-Senator's Lawyers Serve Notice of Objection to Every Answer.

Philadelphia, April 18.-Meyer Goldsmith, the commonwealth's expert accountant, was on the stand all day yesterday in the trial of Senator Quay, making statements of fact that are apmain statements of fact that are ap-parently damaging to the defendant's side of the case. Goldsmith is the main witness for the prosecution and it is through him that all of the documentary evidence is to be presented. This witness has examined the bank's books thoroughly and he came into court yesterday with a number of typewritten sheets containing figures that he gathered from the various books, relating mainly to the deposit of the state treasurer and the account of Senator Quay. He swore to the cor-rectness of his work and then the district attorney formally offered the paper in evidence. This was objected to by the defense on the ground that such a paper is not testimony. It was insisted that the books themselves sho be placed before the witness and his statements uttered from what he saw entered in them. The judge decided in

favor of the defense.

Although the defense apparently gained this point, the paper was practically in evidence, witness Goldamith using its contents in framing his an-swers to the district attorney's questions. When the Quay lawyers ob-jected to this they were met by the judge's explanation that while the paper could not be used as sworn eviince, the witness might use it to re fresh his memory. One effect of all this was to make certain that the case will now go to the jury, there having been some doubt on this point up to the decision to admit all that Goldsmith

Just before the close of the day's ceedings there was another ruling by Judge Biddle in favor of the defense which may have an important bearing on the future of the case. The statute of limitations has been pleaded again and again by Senator Quay's lawyers as a bar to much of the testimony presented by the commonwealth. As Mr. Quay was indicted on Nov. 17, 1898, the two years allowed by the statute for prosecution would extend back only to Nov. 17, 1896. On this basis Mr. Watson has frequently urged Judge Biddle to exclude mention of transactions dating back to 1886, when Mr. Quay was state treasurer. The court has uniformly held, in effect, that the statute of limitations does not affect the evidence but does affect the crime.

The district attorney pointed out that he alleges the defendant's guilt during the two years the law confines him to, and to prove this the corroborative evidence of the previous years should certainly be admitted. Judge Biddle decided against the com-monwealth. He ruled that the evi-dence should be confined to the conspiracy alleged and not to some other

conspiracy.

It is interesting to note that there was every indication that the judge was about to rule against Mr. Quay when Mr. Watson got in another little speech, begging the court to consider the point that the prosecution has so far failed to show a specific conspiracy, and this should be done before it went into the general question of conspiracy. The judge took this view, and ruled accordingly. The lawyers for the defense claim that the decision practically rules out the figures prior to Nov. 17, 1896. Mr. Rothermel says its effect will be to prevent him from offering much of the evidence he hoped

All day long Mr. Goldsmith read out figures taken from the bank books, embracing the various settlement periods of six months, each dating back to Oct. 31, 1893, showing the amount of the state deposit, the amount loaned to Senator Quay during each six months, the amount of interest allowed the state treasurer for that portion of the state deposit apparently not set aside for Senator Quay's use, the amount of interest, if any, the senator paid on his loans, and the amount of money used to purchase stock for him. The deposit during the years men-tioned ranged from \$1,200,000 to \$400,-600. Senator Quay's loans were shown to be as great as \$866,000 in one pe riod of six months. Occasionally, the witness said, small and inadequate payments of interest by Senator Quay were shown, but generally there was nothing to indicate that he paid for the

use of the bank's money.

While all these figures were going in counsel for Senator Quay sat silent and motionless, listening to the monotonous routine of question and answer. This was in pursuance to an understanding that the defense objected to every answer, that the objection was overruled and an exception noted. This is for future use in a higher court, if necessary. Once Mr. Shields felt constrained to enter an sarnest protest against a witness being permitted to place a man's liberty in jeopardy by making such monstrous statements, based merely on conjecture.

There is no doubt that nearly all of the expert's deductions and figures were obtained from the "red book," about which so much has been said, and against the introduction of which the Quay counsel made such vehement but unavailing objection.
