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THEY FAILED TO ELECT!

The Legislature Will Adjourn To-morrow Without a Senator-elect.

NO CHANGE IN TO-DAY'S VOTE!

The Quizzes Are Said to Favor an Extra Session.

THE JUSTICES' BILL WAS DEFEATED!

But Will be Called up Again To-night for Reconsideration--The County Solicitor Bill Passed Finally and Now in the Hands of the Governor--The Bribers to be Criminally Prosecuted.

Harrisburg, April 19.—Every indication points to the adjournment of the legislature without electing a United States Senator. The friends of Senator Quay, to the number of 93, who yesterday declared they would stick to him until the end, have fulfilled that promise. The vote to-day was similar to that of yesterday.

There were no further desertions from the Quay column, he again being thirty-one short of an election. The result was as follows:

This is the last ballot of the session, as the legislature adjourns to-morrow at noon. There are those who contend that the joint resolution providing for adjournment fixes the day, but not the hour, and therefore a vote may be taken at noon to-morrow, but this will hardly be done.

THE JUSTICES' BILL.

The bill introduced by Senator Loebe, and which passed the Senate and was amended in the House, providing for the appointment of one Justice of the Peace in each ward of boroughs in counties of 100,000 population and over, was defeated in the House this morning on final passage. The bill had been referred to a committee of conference, after the House amendment had been attached, which was unconstitutional, and the conference committee reported the bill to-day without the amendment, and as indicated above was defeated in the House.

COUNTY SOLICITORS.

Early in the session Senator Loebe introduced a bill providing for the creation of the office of County Solicitor in counties containing 150,000 inhabitants (affecting Schuylkill and Lancaster) and prescribing his duties and salary. The bill was passed in a term of three years; that the person elected shall be learned in the law; shall give a bond to the county to the sum of \$10,000; that all law matters of the county shall be under his direction; and no county officer shall employ or retain any additional counsel at the county's expense; that he shall act as legal adviser for all county officers, and that he receive a salary of \$3,000 per annum.

THE BERRIES.

The House adopted a resolution appointing a committee of three of its members to prosecute certain persons charged with bribery in connection with the McCarrall Jury bill and the contract for United States Senator. A clause appropriating \$5000 for the expense of the prosecution will be inserted in the General Appropriation bill with the consent of the House.

The committee charged with the prosecution of the alleged bribery consists of John H. Fox, of Philadelphia, Democrat; Robert C. Young, of Toga, anti-Quay Republican; and Charles E. Voorhes, of Philadelphia, Quay Republican. Messrs. Fox and Young are lawyers and all three prosecutors are members of the Barbery Investigating Committee.

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STATE APPROPRIATIONS.

The Senate passed finally the House appropriation bill, which includes \$22,750 for the State Hospital at Fountain Springs, and \$20,000 for the Pottsville Hospital. These appropriations were strongly urged by Senator Loebe.
