Goldsmith's Evidence Shaken by Cross Examination.

STATEMENTS GREATLY MODIFIED

Or Explained Away by the Question ing of Lawyer Shields-Facts Tending to Show That Amounts Charged to Quay Were Really Loans to Others

Philadelphia, April 19.-The defense had its innings yesterday in the trial of Senator Quay, and it made the most of its opportunity. Expert Account ant Meyer Goldsmith, the commonwealth's witness, was under a scorching fire of cross examination all day and the result thereof justifies the opinion that the network of evidence wrought by the prosecution from the books of the broken bank, tending to show Senator Quay's guilty participa tion in the unlawful use of the bank's money, was very much shaken by the admissions the witness was compelled to make under the skillful questioning of Attorney A. S. L. Shields. Nearly all of the apparently damaging entries attached to Senator Quay's name or account in the bank, as testified to on Monday, were explained away or greatly modified by the statements of the commonwealth's own witness. Judge Biddle's ruling of Monday had the effect of confining testimony tend-ing to show the existence of a conspiracy between Quay, Haywood and Hopkins, as charged in the indictment to the two years ending No. 17, 1898 Lawyer Shields got from the witness the admission that if Hopkins had properly credited Senator Quay's acthere the books would show that at the beginning of the alleged conspir-Nov. 17, 1896, the senator owed bank only \$236, instead of over

\$70,000, as is alleged.
Taking up the allegation that Senator Quay had borrowed \$185,000 during the "settlement period" ending Oct. 31, 1897, the last settlement before the bank closed, Mr. Shields forced from Goldsmith, piece by piece, facts tend-ing to show that in nearly every instance the amounts charged to Senator Quay were really loans to other persons, politicians mostly, for whom Quay endorsed. Where there was a definite loan to Senator Quay the remore devotees every year, so much so that the Seaside Hotels make extra arrangements to accommodate the early Spring visitors.

STRIKERS SENTENCED.

Judge Jackson Sends Them to Prison For Defying Injunction.

A WARNING TO SYMPATHIZERS.

The Judge Declares Such Sympathy Is Mistakon, and That It Is Couceived to a Spirit Which Leads to and Ends in Anarchy.

Wheeling, W. Va., April 79 .- Interest in the street car strike centered yester-day in the special term of the United States court, Judge Jackson on the beach, for the consideration of cases arising out of violation of the judge's injunctions. Four men were tried on the charge of obstructing the operation of the road, and each was given framing of its report. It is regarded thirty days in jail and to pay a fine of \$50. The men were James Byrne, John Hixenbaugh, Charles Reiter and Waverly Pultz. Before passing sentence Judge Jackson addressed him-self to this community generally upon the matter of labor strikes in part as

"The court is here for the purpose of administering the law relating to this case. It is not here for the purpose of administering sympathy to either the street railway company or to those who have been employed by that company, known now as 'strikers,' who are insisting upon the company in-

creasing the wages for their services.

"This is a free country. In a free country like ours competition in every department of life is open to every citizen. He who by diligent and con-tinuous effort acquires not only a competence, but a fortune, has a per-fect right to be protected in it. On the other hand, a laborer of the coun-try who maintains and supports himself and family by his daily toll has an equal right to be protected.

"The trouble in this case seems to be that there is an effort upon the part of the employes of this street railway



JUDGE JOHN JAY JACKSON. company to force the employer, the company, to advance their wages without knowing whether such action upon their part is justified in any respect whatever. The employer is just as much interested in maintaining the operation of the road and in obtaining revenues from it as the employe is interested in obtaining a just and fair compensation for his labor.

"Suppose we reverse the situation ipon this occasion, and the employers determine to reduce the wages of the employes in the service of the company. The employer cannot compel his employe to serve for a reduced rate of wages. If he cannot, is it right and proper that the employe, who steps as to coerce the employer to comply with his request without knowing whether or not the employer can afford to do so?

"Whenever there is not a sufficient remuneration upon the part of the employer for the service of the emplove let the employe leave the serof vice of the employer and seek other

employment. "I understand from the public press that this community is in sympathy with what are now known as the 'strikers.' Let me say now that this is a mistaken sympathy upon their part. No community can decide, as such, between the rights of the employer and the employe. This misguid-ed sympathy is often a wrongful sympathy, and operates not only to the prejudice of the parties for whom the sympathy is expressed, but to the injury and detriment of the public at Labor will always command capital when capital can afford to pay for it. Capital will always command labor when it feels that it is justified in doing so.

Whenever any community undertakes to set up for itself a standard, and to enforce that standard by mob violence, by communistic orders, or by efforts upon their part which are con-ceived in a spirit of anarchy, and which lead to and end in anarchy, then the time has come when the laws of the land must be enforced to control that spirit of anarchy."

But the court will hold as the result of chemical investigations by experts that the canned beef is wholesome and nutritive. 
