PENNSYLVANIA has two Senators, after all.

THE rough riders are to hold a reunion in Chicago this summer. After an experience in Chicago they will be apt to think of El Caney as a mid-summer picnic.

THE appointment of M. S. Quay to succeed himself caused a cold chill to run up the backs of the "insurgent" leaders. They await the next move with a great deal of apprehension.

It must have been a proud moment for Colonel Bryan when he boarded the Raleigh and paced the same decks that Aguirre's feet had trod. And he didn't make a speech.

A CORRESPONDENT of the New York Sun wants to know Colonel Bryan's means of livelihood. It's hardly a fair question, but we should say they are the same as those of any other walking delegate.

THE Superintendent of the Census Bureau has, it is reported, notified Congressman Ryan to the effect that of the number of appointments to be made in his district 40 per cent. will go to him and the other 60 per cent. to the Republicans.

ROMNEY, W. VA., Times says: "Prices are acting very badly. Think of it! Sheep sold at a public sale in this county last week at \$7.75 per head. If the people had any regard for the feelings of the Democratic party they would not permit prices to do such naughty things.

THE election in this county next fall will be an important one, in that the people will choose most of the officials on the hill. The list of offices to be filled is a large one. It therefore behooves the Republicans, if they desire success, to present a united front to the enemy. Get together, gentlemen!

CHAIRMAN FOW, of the bribery investigating committee, makes the assuring statement that the prosecution of the men charged with corruption will go on, notwithstanding the appropriation of \$5,000 for that purpose was not granted by the legislature. He says the cases will be pushed to the bitter end.

ARCHBISHOP KEANE has asked for two years' leave of absence from Rome to return to the United States, and the Pope has granted his request. The question of Americanism being solved, Archbishop Keane's presence at the Vatican is no longer necessary. It is stated that Mgr. O'Connell, rector of the American College in Rome, will also return to the United States.

ONE of the most remarkable trials in the annals of the criminal courts of Pennsylvania was concluded in Philadelphia, when Matthew Stanley Quay was declared not guilty of the charge of conspiracy. To the credit of all concerned in the conduct of the case, factional feeling did not creep into the trial, and the verdict was rendered in accordance with the testimony submitted. It was a trial most ably and fairly conducted in every particular. Senator Quay is certainly to be congratulated on the verdict of acquittal. Yesterday was certainly a field day for the Beaver statesman—acquitted and appointed Senator to succeed himself.

The city of Toronto has had quite an interesting experience with the Bell Telephone Company, in which they have had practical demonstration of the advantage of competition, having thereby secured not only cheaper service for subscribers, but also realizing a neat sum from the gross earnings. The Bell Company entered into an agreement with the city to pay five per cent. of its gross earnings for the privilege of the exclusive right of operating in Toronto for a period of five years. They paid to the city Treasurer an average of \$7,000 per year. There is a lesson in this story from Toronto for municipalities, both as to their duty to insist on a cheaper telephone rate and to see to it in granting such franchises that a percentage of gross receipts is given and the term for which such franchise is granted is limited.

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## DUEL WITH PITCHFORKS

Ends in the Murder of a Negro by a White Man.  
Chicago, April 22.—Armed with pitchforks, Horace Scott, colored, and Edward Zikmond, a young white man, fought a duel to the death in an alley at the rear of 1830 Indiana avenue. Scott was stabbed in the breast and killed by the pitchfork. Zikmond surrendered to the police three hours later. There had been ill feeling between the men for some time, and yesterday afternoon when Zikmond attempted to drive through the alley and was unable to do so because a wagon by Scott's charge blocked the passage the old quarrel was renewed. Zikmond threatened to kill Scott and the latter ran at him with a pitchfork. Zikmond drove a short distance up the alley, borrowing a small three pronged pitchfork, he ran back to where Scott was working. Scott's weapon was a long pronged affair, and was much longer than that carried by Zikmond. When the two men met they lunged and struck at each other viciously with their forks. The fight lasted fully five minutes, when Zikmond struck Scott's pitchfork aside and then plunged the prongs of his own fork into the negro's breast. Scott staggered into a nearby barn and fell to the floor. Zikmond followed and stood over the dying man until the latter died. The prongs of Zikmond's fork entered Scott's heart.

## General Henry Lands His Successor.

San Juan de Porto Rico, April 22.—The recall of General Guy V. Henry to the United States is regarded regretfully here. He says he was obliged to ask for relief on account of poor health, and he feared that he would die through the summer. The general knows Brigadier General George W. Davis, his successor, and congratulates the people of Porto Rico upon having such a capable governor. He says General Davis is better fitted than he to govern Porto Rico.

Florida's Confession.  
Pana, Ills., April 22.—The mutilated body of Miss Jane Brunot, a wealthy woman of advanced years, was found yesterday in a basket in the woods near her farm, near here, and an hour later the dead woman's sister-in-law, Mrs. Anna Brunot, the latter's 19-year-old son, Henry, and Frederick Sibley were arrested, charged with the woman's murder. Last night young Brunot and Sibley confessed. Mrs. Brunot was visiting her sister-in-law, and during Mrs. Brunot's absence the two murdered "Aunt Jane," expecting to find money on her person. Mrs. Brunot was released.

TWO MORE VICTORIES.  
Our Troops Still Engaged in Fighting Filipinos to Flight.  
Manila, April 22.—A force of about 200 rebels on Thursday afternoon attacked the outposts of the Washington regiment near Taguig, south of Pasig and Patateros. Two companies immediately engaged the enemy and advanced into the open in skirmish order. The rebels were checked and routed after two hours' fighting, leaving 12 men killed on the field and several wounded. The American troops also obtained possession of many Mauser rifles and many other weapons. Three Americans were wounded.

Yesterday morning three companies of the South Dakota regiment marched from Bocave and in conjunction with three companies of the Minnesota regiment from Guiguinto, north of Bocave, encountered a rebel force numbering fully 600 men, when two miles out. The enemy retired three miles in fairly good order, but in spite of the fact the rebels suffered heavy losses. The Americans, having exhausted their ammunition, were compelled to return to their camps.

## GERMAN WARSHIP FOR SAMOA.

The Kaiser's Government Justified in Sending Another Vessel.  
Washington, April 22.—The report coming from Shanghai via London that another German war vessel has been ordered to Samoa was received with interest by officials here, though no particular importance was attached by them to the report, the opinion being expressed that the German government was simply making an admission of its prestige in the island group, where her material interests are greater than those of other nations represented there. These, it is claimed, have been endangered by recent happenings to the prejudice of the country. Such an act, a German diplomat has written, is to be construed as unfriendly to the interests of this government nor as a menace to existing conditions. Germany at this time has only one war vessel at Apia, while Great Britain has two and the United States one. The suggestion was made that the Kaiser's government should send to Apia, for an additional vessel might be sent to Apia. The report that an extra supply of ammunition would be embarked at Kiao Chou is probably a malicious invention.

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
