COMPETE WITH BLACK DIAMOND.
A Rumor to the Effect That the P. & R. Will Run a Fast Train.

A rumor is going the rounds to the effect that the P. & R. railway company is contemplating running two vestibule trains between Buffalo, N. Y., and Philadelphia and New York City, to compete with the Lehigh Valley Black Diamond Express.

If the report is correct it is likely that the new trains will be put on at the first change in schedule. The trains will connect with the Fall Brook at Williamsport. Only about six stops will be made between Williamsport and Philadelphia, according to the statement of a gentleman who is in a position to know, and Shamokin will be one of them. The time made if the trains are put on, will be about the same as the Black Diamond Express.—Shamokin Herald.
