### CUBAN RECONSTRUCTION

#### Governor of Matanzas a Vigorous Anti-Annexionist.

#### CIVIL EMPLOYEES WANT A SHARE

Of the Three Million Dollars Contributed by the United States for the Benefit of the Cuban Army—Two Cubans Who Decline Judgeships.

Havana, April 26.—Carlos Manuel de Cespedes, of the staff of General Gomez, and who was recently sent to Santiago to make an estimate of the number of Cuban soldiers in the province, called upon the governor general yesterday and reported that there were 20,000 there—half the whole number in the island.

General Gomez yesterday afternoon received at Quinta de los Molinos five generals of the consulting committee appointed to consider with him the army's future and the details of the arrangements with the United States military authorities. Cespedes was present. The conference agreed to the precise terms of the manifesto to be issued by Gomez to the Cuban people and army.

General Pedro Betancourt, the new civil governor of Matanzas, who is a vigorous anti-annexionist, has written to General Gomez placing the command of his corps and his own services at the disposition of Gomez. In concluding his letter he says:

"We are now commencing the most difficult episode in the long struggle to secure our ideal: the reconstruction of the country imposes duties upon us which we must fulfill with the same faithfulness as the obligations of war."

Yesterday General Brooke and the advisory cabinet spent two hours in considering the names of representative Cuban lawyers who have been suggested as members of the newly constituted supreme court. Already two who have been offered positions in the tribunal, Senor Smith of Matanzas and Senor Pichardo of Puerto Principe, have declined.

General Brooke is considering the issuance of a decree making marriages by Protestant clergymen in Cuba legal and legalizing the marriages of Cuban soldiers in the field by military chiefs, provided these are recorded, as the civil law requires.

General Miguel Gomez, civil governor of Santa Clara, has issued a decree declaring that all persons are equal before the law, regardless of race or color.

Forty-five former American soldiers are now enrolled in the Havana police force.

### CALAMITY TRENCHES

#### Captured by MacArthur's Troops After Some Lively Fighting.

#### OUR CASUALTIES THIRTY-FOUR.

Of These Six Were Killed, While the Rebels Left Seventy Dead—Briant Charge of Company K, of the Twelfth Kansas Volunteers.

Manila, April 26.—General MacArthur's division fought its way to the Filipino trenches before Calumpit yesterday, advancing four miles, mostly through woods and jungle, and crossing the Bagbag river. This was accomplished at a cost to the Americans of six killed and twenty-eight wounded. The First South Dakota regiment being the heaviest loser.

After fording the river the South Dakotans pursued the insurgents to the outskirts of Calumpit, but the town was so strongly protected that General MacArthur deemed it best to withdraw the first fighters and to go into camp in a quiet rest before making the final assault.

The largest buildings in Calumpit were being fired by the Filipinos while the Americans were crossing the river fully a mile away, indicating the enemy's intention to abandon the place. The insurgent troops, who had adopted a settled policy of retiring from one position after another, after inflicting the greatest possible damage upon the advancing army. Their forces yesterday were well drilled. Every foot of the ground was tenaciously disputed by the American troops, who showed remarkably firm even before artillery.

The enemy had planned to wreck our artillery transport train. The attempt failed, but a span of the iron-rail bridge over the river was destroyed, hampering the American transportation for some time. The Filipinos cut the girders, intending to have the structure fall with the train, but it collapsed prematurely of its own weight.

The Bagbag river, which is about a hundred yards wide at that point, was splendidly fortified, and the Americans were compelled to approach across an open space, from which the rebels had cleared every obstruction to sight. The bank of the river, a high bluff, was surmounted with trenches, capped with rocks, loopholed and partly hidden by bushes.

The Kansas regiment, having approached the river along the railroad, leaving camp beyond Malolos city, General Hale's brigade, which started on Monday, was earlier on the march, and sweeping westward toward the railroad. The armored train was being pushed by Chinaman, the Twentieth Kansas regiment, advancing in extended order on the left and the First Montana regiment, with the Utah light artillery, on the right.

The rapid firing guns on the train opened the battle about a mile from the river, their popping alternating continuously with the boom of the 6-pounders.

The Montana regiment and the Utah artillery batteries at the same time entered the jungle, from which the insurgents, who were occupying a large, straggling village of huts, poured heavy volleys. In the course of an hour the Americans had forced a passage through the woods to the open space in front of the river, and the artillery, immediately on wheeling into the open, began shelling the Filipino trenches.

In the meantime Company K, Twentieth Kansas, led by Captain Bolivar, performed one of the most brilliant achievements of the campaign. The regiment was being held in reserve, and Company K charged a distance of a quarter of a mile over a cordoned to the bank of the river, near the bridge, where the insurgents from a trench were sniping the armored train, then about 200 yards from the track. The company found shelter in a ditch.

Colonel Frederick Funston called for volunteers to cross the river, and the colonel himself, Lieutenant Ball, a private of Company K, a private of Company E, Trumpeter Barfield and Corporal Ferguson, of Company I, crawled along the iron girders.

While this was going on the men of Company K, from the ditch, were endeavoring to divert attention, but the Filipinos got the range from a trench down the river, and their bullets splattered the water under the structure.

Having reached the broken span, the small but valorous party of Americans slid down the caisson, swam a few yards to the shore and crawled up the bank, the first company landing, then to the trenches, revolver in hand, while the few remaining Filipinos bolted.

Colonel Funston said afterward: "It was not much to do. We knew they could not shoot straight, and that our boys would attend to them while we were crossing."

General Hale's troops, on the right, had the hardest fighting. They followed the north bank of the river, nearest the town, from the east, with the First Nebraska regiment on the left and the First South Dakota and the First Iowa regiments on the right.

General Hale's right joined General Wheaton's left soon after noon, a curve in the river enabling the Americans to pour an enflading fire into the enemy's trenches.

About this time the cheers of the Kansas troops announced that the Americans had crossed the river. General Hale's men began to ford the river, a branch of the Bagbag, stretching to the northeast. The general himself plunged in up to his neck, and the regiments, all carrying flags, floundered across the stream. The guns of the Utah light artillery were dragged over next and formed into an extended line to advance upon the trenches before Calumpit, from which the Filipinos were pouring continuous volleys.

The armored car had one man killed and two wounded. The Kansas regiment had three wounded during the charge and the Utah light artillery had one killed and two wounded.

It is difficult to estimate the insurgent losses, but they had no fewer than 70 killed, many of them by the artillery.

### RUSSIAN INTRIGUE IN KOREA.

Couriers May Soon Become Practically a Proverb of the East.

Vancouver, B. C., April 26.—The steamer Empress of China, which arrived here yesterday morning from Hong Kong and Yokohama, has on board several Chinese refugees, who, the Klung Yu Wei, have been compelled to leave Japan.

Korean advisers say the emperor has leased three ports in eastern Korea to a Russian wharfing company. The concession in each case is 700 meters in length and 50 in width.

There has been another disturbance in the Korean cabinet. Two ministers were driven out of office and banished for terms of ten and twelve years, respectively. The incident was due to an intrigue of Lady Gu, the favorite mistress of the Korean emperor. She has so completely entrapped the emperor that he is a puppet in her hands. Russian had, by some means or other, secured her sympathy. The two disgraced ministers were, apparently, did not know this and imprudently rejected the demands of the St. Petersburg government in connection with wharfing privileges for Russian subjects. The upshot of the affair was that Russia appealed to Lady Gu, who lectured the emperor. The emperor, however, burst forth into terrible wrath and ordered the two ministers out of the cabinet into exile.

Though nothing remarkable appears on the surface, a keen struggle is being steadily waged in Korea between Russia and Japan. It is expected that Korea will be practically a Russian province before long.

### Strike Hits in Bohemia.

Budweis, Bohemia, April 26.—The strike that has been in progress here for some time culminated yesterday in rioting, and in the collision between the troops and the rioters several persons were wounded.
