POTTSVILLE NEWS.

happenings in Court and Elsewhere at the County Seat.

Pottsville, May 4th.—So much has been said about the uproar in the School Directors county convention that it is but fair to state that the hubbub was caused by a limited number of persons, say fifteen or twenty.

The marriage of Miss Mae Saylor, granddaughter of Charles Saylor, deceased, late a lumber merchant of Pottsville, took place at Bridgeport. Joseph O'Leary, a member of the same theatrical company, was the groom. Mrs. O'Leary is a sweet singer of illustrated songs and has friends in Mahanoy City and Shenandoah.

The funeral of Mrs. McCoy passed through here from Suffolk on the way to Minersville. Controller Moldovan says the reason he does not sign the warrants for the payment of Constables for fighting forest fires is because the County Commissioners have not yet approved of the bills, and they must do so first.

Joseph F. Patterson was re-elected president of the Mid Winter Educational Club; Mr. Lubold, Vice President and Horace Smith, Secretary. "Bret Harte and his Works" by A. D. Kittle and J. Harry Fiser were the subject discussed and proved very entertaining.

The Controller reported to the Commissioners that the county receipts for April amounted to \$20,314 and the total expenses were \$27,027.74. The balance in the treasury is \$105,446.21, and the outstanding treasury warrants amount to \$1,028.94.

The feeling caused by the new change in Alms-house management has bequeathed a source of contention between Lee Bros., grocers, of Pottsville, and the Controller, who refuses to approve a bill of their's amounting to \$676 for potatoes furnished at the rate of 85 cents per bushel. The Tax-payers' Association sustain the Controller because no bids were asked for on these potatoes and the organization claims the market price at the time was 85 cents per bushel. The action of the County Alms-house officials in buying the potatoes without asking bids is held to be a violation of that section of the Controller's act which requires bids on supplies costing \$100 and more.

John F. Schoener, tax collector of Mahanoy City, made a payment to the County Treasurer on his 1897 and 1898 delinquents.

A marriage license was granted to Charles A. Reising and Miss A. Jones, both of Ryan township.

WENLOCK CONVICTED.
George Wenlock was found guilty of larceny of a dog, on oath of William Hopkins, of Shenandoah. He received a sentence of 30 days, costs, and 30 days.

THE CASE SETTLED.
A true bill was found at the last term of criminal court against the School Directors of New Castle township, charged with mis-demeanor in office in issuing fraudulent orders, on oath of Daniel Christian, of the Coal and Iron police. The case was to have been tried this term of court, but an amicable settlement of the matter was reached and the court allowed the case to be not prosed.

WIFE FOR DAMAGED.
Mrs. Margaret McIntyre, of Eagle Hill, in behalf of herself and her own ten fatherless children, filed suit at the Prothonotary's office to recover \$10,000 damages against the Marion Coal Company for the loss of her husband, James McIntyre, killed in the defendant company's mine at Mill Creek several months ago, and negligence is alleged.

CHANGED WITH LUCKEY.
George Ewella, of Mahanoy City, charged with larceny as bailie, on oath of P. & R. C. & L. Co. police, was called for trial. The suit is brought to recover \$12.50, money said to have been taken from pay envelopes not the property of the defendant. The jury retired this afternoon.

THE BOND CASE.
The County Commissioners to-day completed the signing of one hundred and seventy-eight of the \$1,000 bonds negotiated for with H. H. Pierson, the Philadelphia broker. The Commissioners say they have now completed their part of the contract, and await Controller Moldovan's signature to the bonds. The H. C. Meyer, publisher of the Miner's Journal, the complainant in an article appearing in the former paper reflecting upon the character of Mr. Meyer. The case will likely be tried next week.

Brueich, prosecutor, county for costs; Adam Bajas, assault and battery; Joseph Yankonky, prosecutor, for costs; Joseph Yankonky, violating liquor laws, oath of Daniel Davis; Peter Alukis and George Kripke, assault and battery on oath of Anthony Muckulinas; Elot Demoshoidt, larceny, oath of Frank Yankonky; Matt and Belle Bugness, Anthony Grollaus and Anthony Matchulis, malicious mischief, oath of Aggie Rutkowski; Edmund Harris, larceny of chickens, oath of Mrs. Yousif Alkewicz, for costs.

MINOR CRIMINAL COURT NOTES.
The following cases have been disposed of: Frank Bollman, larceny, on oath of Jacob Shumonsky, not guilty, each pay half the costs.

Jacob Erly, usual charge, on oath of Cora A. Zettlemoyer, pleaded guilty, usual sentence.

James Mahaney, surety, oath of William Kuehn. Court heard the parties and directed the prosecutor to pay one third and the defendant two thirds of the costs.

A. Patchulis was found guilty of assault and battery, on oath of Martin Pomasna.

Peter Laconis, assault and battery on oath of Bob Zotkanski, not guilty; prosecutor pay 1/2 and defendant 1/2 of the costs.

The jury is out in the case of Anthony Walsbit, charged with assault and battery on oath of John Kosulsky.

James Brennan and Michael Dougherty, of New Philadelphia, are on trial before Judge Bechtel, charged with assault and battery.

Joseph Wesczak is on trial charged with larceny as bailie. The prosecutor is Michael Scoulan.

The Pottsville Council issued a temporary loan of \$15,000 at its last meeting.

A pension of \$8 per month has been granted to Thomas Brown, of Mahanoy City. Side path commissioners are being appointed in almost every county in the state.

Charles Steiner, of Mt. Carmel, has accepted the position of reporter on the Miner's Journal.

Dr. P. O. Heller, the well known physician, is lying dangerously ill at his home at Girardville.

T. D. Fritch has presented a \$1,000 brass lectern to the Salem Lutheran church, of Bethlehem.

The re-organization of Company K of St. Clair, is assured, 30 members of the old company having signed the muster rolls. Fifteen of these have already passed the physical examination.

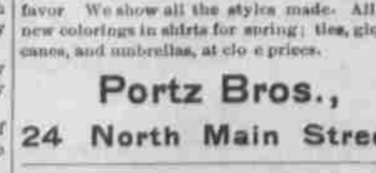
