### DISSENTING CUBANS.

#### Members of the Late Assembly Show Hatred of Americans.

#### COMED DENOUNCED AS A TRAITOR

Havana Newspapers Continue to Publish Stories of Brigandage, Especially in Cienfuegos—How Ludlow's Staff Officer Stopped Stevedore Strike

Havana, May 6.—The banquet given Thursday evening by members of the recently dissolved military assembly in honor of the aged Salvador Cisneros, Marquis de Santa Lucia, the first president of the Republic, was a scene of triumph and of General Mayia Rodriguez was the occasion for an anti-American and anti-Gomez demonstration. General Manuel Sanguily, Colonel Juan Guaberto Gomez, a member of the assembly's executive committee, and other speakers denounced General Gomez as a traitor to Cuba in having given aid to the intervening power—"Los Yankes," who were referred to in terms of dislike and suspicion.

The only voice raised in protest against such assertions among the hundred well known Cubans who were present, including the editors of most of the local papers printed in Spanish, was that of Senor Fidel Piena, editor of El Independiente, who said that the Cubans would most speedily gain their independence by co-operating with the Americans, adding that "the presence of the Spanish military authorities is to aid Cuba to prepare for self government and to leave as soon after as possible."

The local papers continue to fill their columns with stories of brigandage from every part of the island. Some imply that most of these reports are unreliable, others seem to adopt them by giving them special prominence. In the latter class are La Discusion and La Lucha, in the former are El Reconstruccionista, La Patria and all the Spanish organs.

According to a dispatch from Cienfuegos, Senor Hector Perez, a Spaniard of high character and standing, disappeared on Sunday, and yesterday his corpse was found near the city, terribly mangled. The crime is attributed by the authorities to the same band of outlaws who burned the cane fields in the Matanzas plantations. Bandits in the same district attacked the Plantation Unida, owned by Mr. Cullerach, and the Plantation Angeles, owned by Senor Francisco Garcia, but they were finally repulsed by the rural guards, who killed two members of the band who have not yet been identified, and a third who was recognized as Alfredo Rodriguez, a well known brigand largely responsible for disturbances in Santa Clara.

Major Scriver, of General Ludlow's staff, made short work of the strike of stevedores at night yesterday morning, especially when it was found that government business was being affected and the sailing of the transport Havana delayed. He took the names of the ringleaders and then gave them five minutes to choose between remaining and going to jail, or accepting an alternative they declined to face, and the men were soon at work again.

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#### Robels Had Got the Place on Fire and Evacuated.

#### GENERAL LAWTON AT BALINAG.

Detailed Reports Show That There Was Exceptionally Hard Fighting in the Early Part of the Week—Scout Young the First to Enter Balinag.

Manila, May 6.—Major General MacArthur's division advanced to San Fernando yesterday, and found that the place had been evacuated by the insurgents, who left only a small detachment to cover their retreat. The General and MacArthur occupied the burning town without loss.

The insurgents south of Manila attempted to rush through Brigadier General Owenshine's line Thursday night. The attempt failed, but the insurgents maintained a fusillade of musketry on the Fourteenth Infantry regiment for several hours. The demonstration was ineffectual beyond scaring the inhabitants of Malate. The outposts of the Idaho and California regiments beyond San Pedro Macati were also attacked during the night.

Major General Lawton is still quartered at Balinag.

Detailed reports of the work of General Lawton's expedition show that harder fighting took place during the early part of the week than earlier accounts indicated. In an attack upon San Rafael the American forces were met with heavy fire from a large number of insurgents, who were concealed in the jungle on all sides. It was only the adoption of the tactics followed in Indian fighting in the United States, every man for himself, that saved the division from great loss. General Lawton, as usual, was at the head of his line with his staff.

The insurgent leaders Gregorio and Pio del Pilar, who had 800 men in Balinag, retreated upon General Lawton's approach. The Chief of Scouts Young, with 11 men entered Balinag ahead of the army and rang the church bells to announce that they had possession of the city.

General Lawton, when attacking in force outside of Balinag, saw women and children in the enemy's trenches, and sent Captain Case in advance with a white flag to warn the insurgents to remove the non-combatants. When within 500 yards of the trenches two volleys were fired at Captain Case's party.

#### OFFICIALS NOT APPREHENSIVE.

The Value of Lawton's Laguna de Bay Expedition Now Apparent.

Washington, May 6.—The continued rebel demonstrations south of Manila are causing no apprehensions to war department officials, as the brigades of Owenshine and Hall are said to be ample for every emergency. Together they have about 4,800 men, besides the Ninth and Twelfth regular Infantry, who have just arrived at Manila. In view of these sharp demonstrations to the south, the work done by Lawton on his expedition to Laguna de Bay is receiving credit not heretofore accorded to it.

One of the main results of the expedition was to destroy the small craft by which the rebels might have crossed the lake and moved north on the rear of MacArthur's forces. Now they are hemmed in on a narrow strip of land between the lake and the ocean, unable to cross the lake, while the march is too long to circle the lake to the south. Thus the work of Lawton is holding the rebels, some 9,000 in number, to the south, leaving MacArthur free from danger of an attack in force from the rear.

The report that the Filipinos were trying to break through the American lines is evidence to the war department that this force is becoming short of supplies. It is evidently General Otis's intention to remain on the defensive so long as he can keep this force separate from the main body of Aguinaldo. It is said General Otis believes that he can starve this southern army into submission.

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
